Words from Rev. Dr. Sandra Levy-Mix

“It's a Wonderful Life' Rejoice and Be Glad That We Have One Another!”

Well the holidays are finally over! And in the days' run-up to Christmas, David and I observed the annual ritual of watching the old movie, “It's a Wonderful Life,” starring Jimmy Stewart as George Bailey. Assuming that most of you have seen that film directed by Frank Capra in the 1940's but shown every year on TV, I won't take the space here to recap the plot.

But the basic point to that film and it's heartwarming ending where the whole town turns up to rescue George from ruin (and where Clarence, Bailey's guardian angel reminds him that “no man is a failure who has friends” is this: Every life impinges on and shapes other lives—for good or ill. As I wrote in a recent blog (www.Sandralevy.net), in Bailey's case, all of the lives that his life touched, benefitted and flourished because of his goodness and care. He finally understood, with his guardian angel's help, that had he not contributed what he gave, evil would have won. But instead, he followed his best instincts, and saved others in the process.


We do touch each other and have the power—each one of us—to shape each other into better selves. In many cases, we're unaware of the impact we have on other lives. As I have said in books I have written and sermons I have preached, we are connected to one another—from our genes to our brain's “open-loop system” and our neural openness to social and cultural shaping across our life span.

Ultimately of course, I believe that our selves at the deepest level are touched by God's impingement to serve and shape others for good if we just listen for God's call in our lives. This past Sunday I preached on Samuel's call by God as he slept by the Ark of the Lord in the temple of Shiloh (First Samuel 3:1-20). If you remember Samuel's story, he did finally understand that it was God's voice calling to him in the middle of the night. Finally he responded, “Speak Lord. Your servant is listening.” And his whole life pivoted as he headed in a new direction.

As I pointed out, the trick of course is hearing God's voice in all the clamor and busyness and messiness of your life. As apparently George Bailey listened to his better angels (or at least Clarence!) to support those in need in his own small town of Bedford Falls, sacrificing his own ambitions for the sake of others. If we just have ears to hear, we can also hear God's call in our own life through the circumstances in which we find ourselves.

In that sermon, I repeated what some wise person said to me years ago. God's call is heard where your greatest gladness meets your neighbor's needs. . . or your friends's needs. . . or the needs of that lost soul across town or across the street. And like Samuel, like George Bailey, if you listen real hard and keep your eyes and ears open to see and hear, you will find that place of purpose and joy in your life.

So the question remains. What is God trying, longing to say to each one of you right where you are in your life? Well the message is different for each of us because our individual lives and circumstances are very different. But the beginning of our new journey is the same for us all. When you summon your courage and open your mouth and say “Speak, Lord. . . speak. I'm listening.” And then just go. And do God's bidding as George Bailey did to all he touched.

Why do we Episcopalians ...?

Every year St. Martin's makes Episcopal liturgical wall calendars available, usually laying on the table at the end of the long hall way. I always take one because it helps me with the Cloak. Every month I look to find which Saint might be celebrated and when certain seasons start.

This time there was more. There were Ember Days. See page 3 "What and When..."



What Are Ember Days?

The name is derived from the Latin *quattuor tempora*, meaning "Four Times" or "Four Seasons." The purpose of their introduction was to thank God for the gifts of nature, to teach men to make use of them in moderation, and to assist the needy.

Among many Christians, it is a custom to observe Ember Days, this cluster of four sets of three days in the calendar year, roughly around the start of the seasons. They are set aside by the Church as a way to mark the passage of seasons through prayer and fasting. As the Ember Days came to be associated with great feast days, they later lost their connection to agriculture and came to be regarded solely as days of penitence and prayer.

The specific themes for each Ember Week of the year are as follows:

Spring: the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after Ash Wednesday, to give thanks for the rebirth of nature and for the gift of light (usually flowers are offered at this time).

Summer: Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after Pentecost, to give thanks for the wheat crop.

Fall: the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after the Feast of the Holy Cross (September 14), to give thanks for the grape harvest.

Winter: the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after the Feast of St. Lucy (December 13), during the third week of Advent, to give thanks for the olive crop. The significance of the days of the week is that Wednesday was the day Christ was betrayed, Friday was the day He was crucified, and Saturday was the day He was entombed.

And on the back of the calendar was more information:

The **Christian Year** is as old as the Resurrection of our Lord and as new as the latest revisions. With the resurrection, the disciples of Jesus began a weekly celebration of the event on the First Day of the week. These disciples, like their Lord, had all their lives observed the Jewish Ritual Year. But eventually they substituted Sunday, the First Day of the week, for Saturday the Seventh Day, Easter for the Passover, and the Baptism of the Holy Spirit for the giving of the Law from Sinai. Together with this they soon began to observe the Nativity of the Lord. Adding certain preparatory and penitential seasons, they had by the sixth century developed a Christian Year for the order of worship, substantially as we have it today.

Lent is a preparatory time. It begins this month with Ash Wednesday falling on the 17th.

Thank you, Fr Lee, for proofreading and approving the booklet.



THE VACCINES

Well, the vaccines are here, but the roll out has been less than smooth. The states have received less vaccines than promised and there are long lines in so many states of people waiting for the vaccine. There are difficulties trying to schedule a time for the vaccine on line, and trying to reach someone by phone reportedly takes hours.

Here in Virginia we have started phase **1b**. Phase **1a** covered healthcare personnel and residents of long term care facilities. There are still persons in that group to be vaccinated. Virginia is committed to get the vaccines into arms as quickly as possible as supplies come in.

Phase **1b** includes :

- Essential Front line workers
- People age 65 and older
- People 64 -16 with underlying medical condition
- People living in correctional facilities, homeless shelters, and migrant labor camps

It is still not available for under age16.

Vaccines can be accessed from:

- Local health departments
- Pharmacies
- Healthcare systems
- Employer-based occupational health units

Listen for information from your local health departments or healthcare providers about how and when you can get the vaccine. Scheduling will depend on the supply of the vaccine available.



The Department of Corrections, local and regional jails and their occupational health programs will vaccinate staff and persons living in those facilities. Those living in homeless shelters and migrant labor camps will be vaccinated through their local health department or through arrangements with healthcare systems and pharmacies.

There is good news. Johnson and Johnson single dose vaccine is in phase 3 trial. The data looks promising. Early stage trials found >90% of participants developed antibodies. There were no major concerns with safety. There were similar side effects as with the 2 previously approved vaccines. These include pain at the injection site, cold symptoms, headaches, body aches, fever and fatigue. These symptoms lasted about 2 days. You will need to let your provider know if you have had prior allergic reaction to a vaccine as there has been allergic reactions documented with the 2 vaccines in use now.

This vaccine can be stored in a regular refrigerator for up to 3 months. Although the vaccine is said to be about 2 months behind

schedule, J&J are hoping to have the results of phase 3 study in a couple of weeks. However, they will still need to apply for Emergency Use Authorization and approval before we can see shipment of these vaccines.

We must continue to be vigilant with this virus by wearing your mask, washing our hands, maintaining social distancing, not congregating in large groups. We will exercise patience as we await our time to receive our vaccine. Be safe.
