As we approach the return to normalcy. I will be sending out a series of reflections about church and our call to live out our faith in Jesus Christ.

I hope these reflections will help to prepare our hearts and minds as we return to worship and work together. Below is the first Reflection:

Reflection

Peter's Declaration about Jesus

¹³ Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" ¹⁴ And they said, "Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." ¹⁵ He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" ¹⁶ Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, I the Son of the living God." ¹⁷ And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. ¹⁸ And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock. I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. ¹⁹ I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." ²⁰ Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

The church does not belong to the founding members. The church does not belong to the person who gives the most money or the most time, or the Priest. The Church we refer to as "my church" belongs to Jesus. When we use the term "my Church" we need to recognize we are using it in the sense of belonging not ownership. It's like a sports fan talking about "my team", it is about commitment and support not ownership.

This is the first time the word church appears in the gospel of Matthew. It occurs as the result of a question to Peter, "who do you say that I am." In the conversation we see that the church flows out of a recognition of the character of Jesus. The question "who do you say that I am", leads to "I will build my church." What does this story tell you about what the church should look like?

Words from Rev. Dr. Sandra Levy-Mix

"Julian of Norwich and a Monastic Note"


Some of you might have noticed that my car's license plate reads OBJN. Over the years, folks have been curious about what the letters stand for. Some have even asked if I'm an ObGyn perhaps? I've hastened to assure them that I'm not—so if you are in labor, I'm probably not going to be of great help! Anyway, the letters stand for the designation Oblate of the Julian Order.

The Order of Julian of Norwich is a contemplative Order of the Episcopal Church. The Order's Mother house is now in White Lake, Wisconsin, having moved in the past few years from Waukesha to its present site. There are various degrees of affiliation with the Order, including Associate, Oblate, and Members regular—the latter who actually live an enclosed life within the community's property. Associates—while striving to live by the Order's Rule (daily Office, at least weekly Eucharist, days of obligation observance, etc.), Oblates take vows to follow the same rule of life as those living within the confines of the monastery, itself. Including the practice of daily meditation and silent prayer.

Anyway, I have been an Oblate since around 2002, and have succeeded more or less over the years to observe daily and weekly practices in line with the vows I took so many years ago. Among the Order's disciplines is the requirement to have a Spiritual Director (someone to meet with periodically to mutually share what we see God perhaps doing in our daily lives, examine the state of our prayer lives, and so on. I have been blessed with a Director and friend who has become dear to me over the past few years. He's a Roman Catholic priest by the name of Fr. Peter Creed.

I'm going into all this because Fr. Pete has become immersed in Julian of Norwich's theology, and the last time we were together, he gave me a book that has been out a few years—published in 2016. (We tend to give each other books that mean something to us spiritually and want to share it with the other.) The title of this book is *The Drawing of This Love: Growing in Faith with Julian of Norwich*, and its author is Robert Fruehwirth. I knew Robert when he was Guardian of the Order, and the book is very well written and worth taking a look at if you are interested.

But first, a word about Julian of Norwich, herself. She was born around the year 1342 and lived during the time of the Black Plague that swept across Europe and England during her lifetime. When she was around 30 years of age, she underwent a series of experiences that she understood as direct experiences of God or mystical experiences during a time when she herself was very ill. She survived the illness that she assumed at the time was mortal, and these experiences of God became the source of her writing over the course of her life. She became an anchorite at St. Julian's Church in Norwich, taking vows that consecrated her life to prayer and solitude, walled up within the church's building in a way that allowed her access to communion through an opening into the church's nave, and also allowed her to give spiritual advice to others who came to her window from the outside world.



Again, over her lifetime she wrote down her understanding of her early mystical encounter with God and her text is commonly known as *The Revelations of Divine Love*—easily available today in book stores and through Amazon. Her deep theology embedded in this text earned Julian the designation of Doctor of Theology by the Roman Catholic Church and her writing is the first known work written in English by a mediaeval woman.

Whether you've ever read Julian's work, you probably know her words "All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well"—reported by her to be uttered by Christ in her vision of Him on

supposedly her death bed. I have found comfort in those words and as a pastor, have sat with others in times of struggle and talked about God's ultimate promise to us all. There is, in fact, so much to say about

Julian's life and work, and many books have been devoted to her theological writing. But in the interest of space here, let me just share a short quote from Fruehwirth's book--since this is currently my own afternoon reading during my quiet time of the day. On pgs. 30-1, he says

All our seeking of God is a result of already having found something of God, and wanting more. . . That it will be helpful to us if we approach our lives now with the belief, with the assumption, that God is already in this moment—not yesterday, not tomorrow, but this moment right in front of us. Practicing this, we open ourselves to the present moment in the assumption that God is here, and that we are already seeing God.

Food for thought folks. So join me and experience Julian's work–revisiting or discovering for the first time–and nourish your soul in the process.

Heart Disease and Women

Heart disease is the number one killer of American women. Some heart disease symptoms and risk factors are different for women than men. Some risk factors, such as obesity, metabolic syndrome, and depression, happen more often in women. Women also have unique risk factors for heart disease, such as menopause. Some heart disease risk factors, such as diabetes and smoking, are even more dangerous for women. Women do worse after heart attacks compared to men, and women are less likely to join and complete a cardiac rehab program.

Q: What is heart disease?

A: "Heart disease" refers to several types of problems that affect the heart. The most common type of heart disease is coronary artery disease (CAD), also called coronary heart disease. In CAD, plaque builds up on the walls of the arteries that carry blood to the heart. Over time, this buildup causes the arteries to narrow and harden, a process called atherosclerosis. This prevents the heart from getting all the blood it needs. It can also cause a blood clot to develop. If the clot blocks blood flow to the heart it can cause a heart attack.

Q: How do I know if I have heart disease?

A: Heart disease often has no symptoms you can feel, like pain or shortness of breath. Two out of every 3 women who die suddenly from heart disease did not have symptoms.

But there are some signs to watch for. Chest or arm pain or discomfort can be a symptom of heart disease or a warning sign of a heart attack. Women often describe a burning chest pain or pain in the back, neck or jaw. See the 7 signs of a heart attack at the **womenshealth.gov/heartattack** website. Call 911 if you think you are having a heart attack, rather than driving yourself to the hospital.

If you think you may have heart disease, talk to your doctor. He or she will do tests and ask about your family medical history and health behaviors like smoking, physical activity, and healthy eating.

Q: What do I need to know about my risk for heart disease?

A: Certain habits and health problems raise your risk for heart disease. You can control many of the risk factors for heart disease.

- Habits you can control include not smoking, eating healthy, getting physical activity, limiting alcohol, and reducing stress. Talk to your doctor and nurse about steps you can take to quit smoking, eat healthier, and lower your stress.
- Health problems you can improve include high blood pressure, high cholesterol, overweight and obesity, and diabetes. If you have one or more of these health problems, work with your doctor or nurse to make healthy changes to lower your risk. Your doctor may also prescribe medicine to help you control your blood pressure or cholesterol.
- Risk factors you can't control include your age, family history, and menopause. Knowing about risk factors you can't control can help you and your doctor decide on a plan to reduce other risk factors for heart disease.

Q: How does pregnancy affect my risk for heart disease?

A: Tell your primary care doctor if you have had gestational high blood pressure, gestational diabetes, or preeclampsia during a past pregnancy. These pregnancy problems are also signs that you are at higher risk for heart disease later in life, after pregnancy. Talk to your doctor or nurse about ways to lower your risk for heart disease.

Q: How does menopause affect my risk for heart disease?

A: Women usually get heart disease about 10 years after men do. This is because until menopause, the ovaries make the hormone estrogen. Estrogen gives premenopausal women some protection against heart disease by keeping blood vessels relaxed and a healthy cholesterol balance.

Q: Does birth control affect my risk for heart disease?

A: Most types of birth control are safe for young, healthy, nonsmoking women. Certain types of combination hormonal birth control (birth control with both estrogen and progesterone), such as the pill, skin patch, or vaginal ring, may raise your risk for heart disease if you are older than 35 or if you have high blood pressure, diabetes, or high cholesterol. If you smoke, do not use hormonal birth control.


