As many of you know we have scheduled 2 parish meetings in June. The first on June 7th and the second on June 14th. The original purpose was to look at how we moved through the pandemic and where we go in the future as a congregation. However we will now include time to discuss the executive boards letter found below. Please read the letter and feel free to share your thoughts at these upcoming meetings.



THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF VIRGINIA

Executive Board Initiates Dialogue on Reparations

The Executive Board met yesterday in a special meeting to debrief on the April 24 Special Convention to Adopt the Budget. The Board considered how the Diocese might develop a process for addressing Resolution BR-4, which was presented in the closing minutes of Convention and was defeated. The resolution proposed to allocate \$1,000,000 from diocesan investment assets to the income category and add a new line item for "Reparations and Undoing White Supremacy." The Executive Board reached consensus that the issue of reparations will be on the agenda for its June meeting.

"The Executive Board recognizes the seriousness of the request and the necessity of discussing the issue," said Board member Alda White. "Reparations is not an easy conversation. Nor is it a short conversation. It is a process. While the Board is unsure of what shape our work will take on this issue, we are committed to taking it on, prayerfully and deliberately."

Board members will employ a variety of resources, including the Diocese's online library of <u>racial</u> <u>justice resources</u>, to develop a basic and common understanding of the issues and concepts around reparations. "Having a common understanding of the subject matter is the beginning of our process," Ms. White added.

Also at yesterday's meeting, the Board discussed improvements to the Convention process and procedures, emphasizing ways to promote trust, transparency and improved communication with churches, clergy and delegates.

The Board also created two subgroups – one to study diocesan assets and the other to study campus ministry. The work of each subgroup will help to inform the development of the 2022 budget.

The Board's Working Group on Budget will begin meeting in June to develop a budget forecast for 2022. Details on how to submit budget requests will be provided by May 31.

The Board will also be considering revisions to the procedural Rules of Order for Convention to improve clarity and consistency.

The Executive Board meets again on June 26 to continue this important work.

June is PTSD awareness month

PTSD (post traumatic stress disorder) is a mental health problem that some people develop after experiencing or witnessing a life-threatening event, Examples include: combat, a natural disaster, a car accident, sexual assault. The COVID 19 pandemic has also produced PTSD in front line workers (health care) or even families watching a loved one suffer or die over the last year.



- Serious accidents, like a car wreckNatural disasters, like a fire,
 - •Natural disasters, like a lire, tornado, hurricane, flood, or earthquake
 - Terrorist attacks

It's normal to relive the difficult memories, have anxiety, or have trouble sleeping after any of these events. Initially, it may be hard to do activities of normal living, like going to work, school, or spending time with people you care about. However, most people start to feel better after a few weeks or months. If it's been longer than a few months and you're still having symptoms, you may have PTSD.

PTSD symptoms may start later on, or they may come and go over time.

Any experience that threatens your life or someone else's can be traumatic and cause PTSD. Types of traumatic events that can cause PTSD include:

- Combat and other military experiences
- Sexual or physical assault
- Learning about the violent or accidental death or injury of a loved one
- Child sexual or physical abuse

A traumatic event could be something that happened to you, or something you saw happen to someone else. Seeing the effects of a horrible or violent event can also

be traumatic — for example, being a first responder after a terrorist attack or healthcare workers during surges of the COVID pandemic.

PTSD symptoms may not be the same for everyone. Reliving memories of the event can occur at any time, they can feel very scary and real and are referred to as a flashback. You may have nightmares. Something that reminds you of the event can trigger a flashback such as hearing a car backfire or seeing a horrific event on the news. Avoiding situations or people that remind you of an event may be helpful. For example, someone who was assaulted on the bus might avoid taking public transportation. Staying busy or occupied may sometimes help.

Some symptoms of PTSD may include:

Having more negative thoughts and feelings than before

- You might be sad or numb and lose interest in things you used to enjoy
- You may feel that the world is dangerous and you can't trust anyone
- It may be hard for you to feel or express happiness, or other positive emotions
- You may feel guilt or shame about the traumatic event itself wishing you could have done more to help.
- You may feel jittery or jumpy, easily startled
- You might have trouble sleeping or concentrating
- You may suddenly get angry and irritable
- You may start smoking, abusing drugs and alcohol, or driving aggressively

Diagnoses of PTSD is made after evaluation by a mental health provider. Questions asked may include your traumatic event, your symptoms and other problems you may have.

Your therapist or doctor will start by talking with you about your PTSD symptoms and your treatment options. Once you've chosen a type of treatment, he will explain the treatment plan, how it will help you feel better, and why it works. Remember, you can always ask questions about your treatment. Both trauma-focused psychotherapies and medication are proven to treat PTSD

For caregivers, learning about PTSD helps you to understand what your loved one is experiencing. It will also be helpful to you to have a support network of family, friends and healthcare providers. Below are some resources for help. These are confidential hotlines

All Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Centers provide PTSD treatment, and many locations around the county offer specialized PTSD programs.

It was so good to see that so many members of our congregation have received their COVID vaccine. We look forward to worshiping again as a congregation singing hymns and praising God for taking us safely through this pandemic so far. We must continue to be vigilant, practicing the healthy measures used as we see the number of infections and hospitalizations continue to decrease. Stay safe and well hydrated through these warm months!

Get to know your brothers and sisters in Christ

Q: Are you a cradle Episcopalian?

A: I was born here, back in that very brief period when there were 49 stars on the flag. I lived here through high school, lived in Maryland for my first year of college and returned home. Kim and I moved away to Northern VA in the mid 1980's, and from there to Charlottesville for my MBA, then Batesville IN, Salem, VA, and back here.

Q: How did you find St. Martin's?

A: We visited for Midnight Services one year and were really touched by the fellowship and obvious caring in the congregation. When we were finally ready to transfer our membership a few months later, St. Martin's was an obvious choice.

Q: What would you like your church friends to know about you, your family, your occupation, hobbies etc?

A: Professional-- After 15 years in Fortune 500s I accepted an offer to come to Richmond to bring some private sector practices to state government management. It was to be a three year assignment. That was 27 years ago. I now oversee 1/3 of the state budget and advise the administration on how best to allocate funding and track results.

Personal -- Kim and I met doing local theater, and we each sporadically performed over the next ten years or so. Kim and I love to experience new and different dining experiences and have been known to drive hundreds of miles just for a specific meal. For fun, I am pretty good at making barbecue, and I travel the central Atlantic states on weekends judging at BBQ competitions throughout the year. I love stargazing and struggling with my veggie garden. Mostly, I enjoy spending time doing anything with Kim and Jessica.

Maddi and Larry had joined us several times when we had parking lot services last fall. Unfortunately more in-person services came to a screeching hold after that.






A glorious Day
