"A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger"

In a given day, there are many opportunities to be angered. And at times it is appropriate to be angry.

However, our anger should be expressed in ways which solve a problem rather than make it worse.

Moses, it seems, struggled with anger during his entire life. Below are four examples from the life of Moses.

- (1) Moses was 40 years old when we came to a Hebrews aid and killed an Egyptian. We are told – He looked around saw no one. Killed the Egyptian and buried him in the sand.
 - When Pharaoh discovered what Moses had done, he wanted him put to death. So, Moses fled the country. He lost his family, life of luxury and security.
- (2) Moses was 80 when he confronted Pharaoh and warned Pharaoh of coming plaques
 - God told Moses that God would harden
 Pharaoh heart
 - Moses knew what to expect
 - But after the 10th plague we are told that Moses delivered God's message in a furious rage and departed in "hot anger".
- (3) Moses returned from receiving the 10 commandments cut into stone by the very hand of God. I can only imagine the value of receiving such object. To have instructions for living a successful life, building a society. But when Moses returns the people have created a Golden Calf to worship.
 - We are told the anger of Moses burned.
 - What does he do? Smashes the commandments.
 - Has calf ground up and makes people drink the concoction.

God never approved these actions of Moses.

 In fact, Moses had to cut the next copy of the commandments himself.





(4) The last example is when the Hebrew people were complaining again of their need for water.

- God told Moses and Aron to speak to a rock and that a spring would pour forth.
- But Moses was angry at the people. So, he calls them a bunch of names, tells them they are losers and said "should Aaron and I make water for you".

His anger put him in the place of God – God was giving the water. God had had enough and told Moses he would never enter into the promised land.

Book of Deuteronomy tells us Moses asked god 3 times to change his mind. God refused.

Moses had been losing his temper since he was 40. He is now 100 and banned from entering the promise land.

Does anger have a disproportionate control of your life?

The Season of Lent calls us to examine our hearts and attitudes towards others. May God open the eyes of our heart to see how we may become effective vessels of God's grace and love in the world.





Spring Fever



While we do not have a "fever", we are hopeful that the spring is finally here. We can look back on the lengthy cold and rainy winter months we endured. There are fewer cold days, we have longer hours of sunlight and we can't wait to get those plants in the ground. Lawn mowers are cranking and debris from those winter months are being removed from the lawns.

For some the change is not soon enough. Many suffer from Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). Usually starting in the fall when the daylight hours get shorter, persons with SAD, complain of lack of energy, mood changes and often in a sense, hibernate. As the hours of sunlight lengthens we see;

- moods are brighter
- attitudes more positive.
- people begin to enjoy the outdoors again
- you eat lighter (less comfort foods)
- energy level is higher (you start exercising again)

However, spring also brings its share of health related issues for those who suffer from allergies. Hay fever and allergic rhinitis are other names associated with the following symptoms:

- itchy, watery eyes and nose
- excessive sneezing
- sniffling
- colds
- cough
- headache

If you are unfortunate enough to suffer from allergies, the following tips may help:

if you can, stay indoors on dry windy days

- avoid doing yard work such as mowing the lawn (wear a mask if you must)
- mold spores can be stirred up by working in garden beds
- once indoors remove clothes, shower/wash hair to wash away pollen
- avoid hanging clothes outdoors
- close windows and doors to limit the amount of pollen in the home
- pollen counts are highest in the morning-avoid outdoor activity at those times
- Measures such as air conditioning with high efficiency filters may help. Change filters as recommended by manufacturer. Vacuum cleaner should also have a HEPA (high efficiency particulate air) filter to avoid recirculating pollen

throughout the home.



Some over the counter remedies may help such as:

- Antihistamine Claritin, Zyrtec, Allegra
- Decongestant Sudafed, Afrin -use only for a couple of days in a row

The above can also be used as combination medications Claritin-D, Allegra-D.

Some sufferers find relief from irrigating the nose with saline solution. Some use a Neti Pot to rinse the nose.

Remember to clean the Neti Pot and allow to air dry after each use.

You will want to contact your Healthcare provider regarding your symptoms particularly if your symptoms are severe or over the counter medications have not helped.








St. Martin's Memorial Garden
