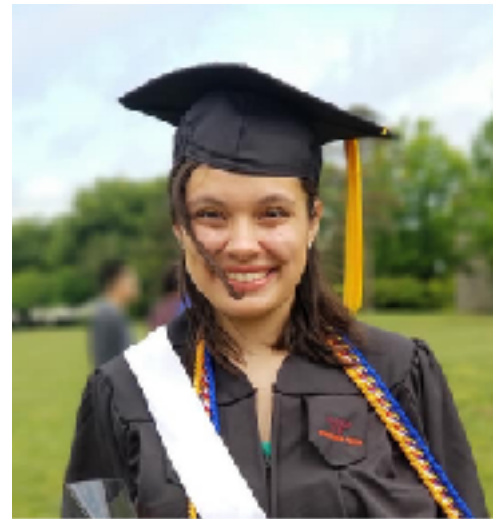


Andrew Wood

While in Peter's flaws Christians might see themselves, they might also see themselves in the moments of Peter's courage and faithfulness, and ultimately they might see in him a picture of what they might aspire to be when empowered and led by the Spirit.”

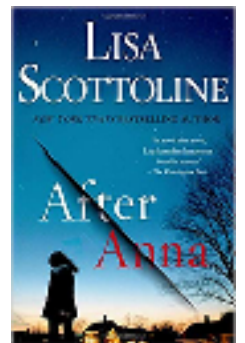

Get to know your brothers and sisters in Christ

Q: Are you a cradle Episcopalian?

A: I was born in England into a strong High Church Anglican family and we attended the 11 am Mass every Sunday with the whole family. At the age of about 5 I became a boat boy to carry the incense and then an acolyte both at the Sunday Mass and later I also served on Fridays at the 6:30 am Mass during school vacations when I was home from boarding school.

While in college and later when I started working I lapsed and became a very occasional worshipper. I met Christa and was relocated to New York and then St Louis. It wasn't until our first child was born that we felt the call back to church becoming a priority. But it was an invitation from a neighbor in St Louis that brought us back to regular attendance, this time at a Lutheran Church. The services included weekly communion and great fellowship and support.

Later when we were relocated to Kentucky we again joined a Lutheran Church and became very active. By this time we had two daughters. For various reasons we later joined an Episcopal Church where we were very happy for many years.

Q: Have you always lived in the Richmond area?

Q: What would you like your church friends to know about you, your family, your occupation, hobbies etc?

A: After graduating from the University of Nottingham in England in 1965 as a metallurgical engineer, I was hired by an aluminum company. I worked there in various roles and locations until I retired. Shortly before I retired we moved to Singapore for my final assignment. It was a great experience to live in South East Asia for about 18 months and we were sad to leave. We love to travel and my job has taken me to several countries. We continue to enjoy experiencing other cultures, but it is always nice to return home. I have walked several routes of the Camino de Santiago in Spain which is a pilgrimage journey on different routes from across Europe to the Cathedral of St James in Santiago, in the North East of Spain. The journeys on foot are long distance hikes of different lengths but typically 500 - 600 miles which take from about 35 - 40 days. I find it spiritually rewarding and the interaction with other pilgrims in the hostels in the evenings always interesting. Of course the Spanish and Portuguese wine is also welcome after a long day of walking! We have three young grandsons in Midlothian and one in Nashville who we love to visit and spend time with. They keep us busy but are a great joy to us.

CMV Awareness Month

Cytomegalovirus or CMV, is a common virus that infects people of all ages. Over half of adults by age 40 have been infected with CMV. Once CMV is in a person's body, it stays there for life and can reactivate. Most people infected with CMV show no signs or symptoms. However, CMV infection can cause serious health problems for people with weakened immune systems and for unborn babies (congenital CMV)

Signs and Symptoms

Most people infected with CMV show no signs or symptoms because a healthy person's immune system usually keeps the virus from causing illness. In many instances most people are not aware that they have been infected,

In some cases, infection in healthy people can cause mild illness much like a mild case of the flu that may include:

- Fever
- Sore throat
- Fatigue
- Swollen glands

Occasionally, CMV can cause mononucleosis or hepatic (liver) problem.

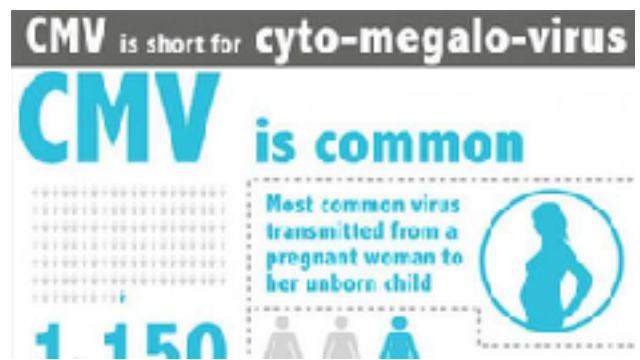
People with weakened immune systems who get CMV can have more serious symptoms affecting the eyes, lungs, liver, esophagus, stomach, and intestines. For example a kidney transplant recipient with active CMV may see worsening of kidney function. Babies born with CMV can

have brain, liver, spleen, lung, and growth problems. The most common health problem in babies born with congenital CMV infection is hearing loss, which may be detected soon after birth or may develop later in childhood.

Transmission and Prevention

People with CMV may pass the virus in body fluids, such as saliva, urine, blood, tears, semen, and breast milk. CMV is spread from an infected person in the following ways:

- From direct contact with saliva or urine, especially from babies and young children
- Through sexual contact
- From breast milk to nursing infants
- Through transplanted organs and blood transfusions

A woman who is infected with CMV can pass the virus to her developing baby during pregnancy. Women may be able to lessen their risk of getting CMV by reducing contact with saliva and urine from babies and young children. The saliva and urine of children with CMV have high amounts of the virus. A pregnant woman can avoid getting a child's saliva in her mouth by, for example, not sharing food, utensils, or cups with a child. Also, she should wash her hands after changing diapers. These cannot eliminate her risk of getting CMV, but may lessen the chances of getting it.



Healthcare providers should follow standard precautions. Pregnant healthcare workers will often avoid contact with CMV infected patients.

Diagnosis

Blood tests can be used to diagnose CMV infection in adults who have symptoms. However, blood is not the best fluid to test newborns with suspected CMV infection. Tests of saliva or urine are preferred for newborns.

Treatment

Healthy people who are infected with CMV usually do not require medical treatment. Medications are available to treat CMV infection in people who have weakened immune systems and babies with signs of congenital CMV. In the case of the kidney transplant patient, they are often treated with anti-viral medications such as Valcyte.

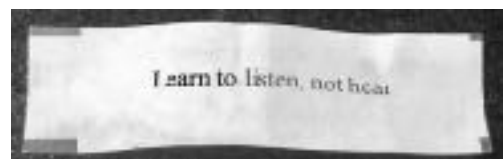
