As you know, your editor is in Europe right now. We are seeing our families in Germany and England but we started with a river cruise down the Danube. One of the events during this touched us and I would like to share it.

In Vidin, Bulgaria, we visited the mosque of Osman Pazvantoglu which we visited next was built in honor of his father, and next to it the library he had built in honor of his mother. A very small mosque in a very small town but with lots of history. We were told that the present Imam was very community oriented and they invited their neighbors as often as possible to their table. The Imam invited us in and answered any question we might have (of course translated).

James raised the question about the radical moslems and he answered in an incredible way ... that we all breathed the same air, used the same water etc etc, and in none of the religious books was it written that it was created for Christians or Moslems or Jews but that our Creator created it for ALL. He strongly said that we all prayed to the same God just in different ways. He was all about peace and love to your neighbors. He encouraged us that this was the message to spread.



Measles

Measles is very contagious and can be serious. An unvaccinated child or adult can get measles when traveling abroad or even in the U.S. Measles was declared eliminated (absence of continuous disease transmission for greater than 12 months) from the United States in 2000. However, since 2011 there has been a steady increase in the number of cases reported in the U.S.

In 2011, more than 30 countries in the WHO (World Health Organization) European Region reported an increase in measles, and France was experiencing a large outbreak. These led to a large number of importations (80) that year. Most of the cases that were brought to the U.S. in 2011 came from France.

The U.S. experienced 11 outbreaks in 2013, three of which had more than 20 cases, including an outbreak with 58 cases.

The U.S. experienced 23 measles outbreaks in 2014, including one large outbreak of 383 cases,

occurring primarily among unvaccinated Amish communities in Ohio. Many of the cases in the U.S. in 2014 were associated with cases brought in from the Philippines, which experienced a large measles outbreak.

An outbreak was linked to an amusement park in California. The outbreak likely started from a traveler who became infected overseas with measles, then visited the amusement park while infectious; however, no source was identified. Analysis by CDC scientists showed that the measles virus type in this outbreak (B3) was identical to the virus type that caused the large measles outbreak in the Philippines in 2014.

A 75-case outbreak was reported in Minnesota in a Somali-American community with poor vaccination coverage. In a community with previously high vaccination coverage, concerns about autism, the perceived increased rates of autism in the Somali-American community, and the misunderstanding that autism was related to the

measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine resulted in a decline in MMR vaccination, Coverage dropped to a level low enough to sustain widespread measles transmission in the Somali-American community following introduction of the virus. Studies have consistently documented that there is not a relationship between vaccines and autism.

The challenges for public health practice

This outbreak demonstrates the challenge of combating misinformation about MMR vaccine and the importance

of creating long-term, trusted relationships with communities to disseminate scientific information in a culturally appropriate and effective manner.

The U.S. experienced 17 outbreaks in 2018. Three outbreaks in New York State, New York City, and New Jersey, respectively, contributed to most of the cases. Cases in those

states occurred primarily among unvaccinated people in Orthodox Jewish communities. These outbreaks were associated with travelers who brought measles back from Israel, where a large outbreak is occurring. Eighty-two people brought measles to the U.S. from other countries in 2018. This is the greatest number of imported cases since measles was eliminated from the U.S. in 2000.

These outbreaks are linked to travelers who brought measles back from other countries such as Israel, Ukraine, and the Philippines, where large measles outbreaks are occurring.

Spread of Measles

- The majority of people who got measles were unvaccinated.
- Measles is still common in many parts of the world.
- Travelers with measles continue to bring the disease into the U.S.
- Measles can spread when it reaches a community in the U.S. where groups of people are unvaccinated.

Measles can be serious.

Some people think of measles as just a little rash and fever that clears up in a few days, but measles can cause serious complications, especially in children younger than 5 years of age. There is no way to tell in advance the severity of the symptoms your child will experience.



•About 1 in 5 people in the U.S. who get measles will be hospitalized •1 out of every 1,000 people with measles will develop brain swelling, which could lead to brain damage •1 to 3 out of 1,000 people with measles will die, even with the best care

Some of the more common measles symptoms include:

- high fever (may spike to more than 104° F),
- cough,
- runny nose (coryza),
- red, watery eyes (conjunctivitis), and
- rash (3-5 days after symptoms begin).

The best way to protect yourself and your loved ones from measles is by getting vaccinated. If you are planning a trip you should plan to be fully vaccinated at least 2 weeks before you depart. If your trip is less than 2 weeks away and

you're not protected against measles, you should still get a dose of MMR vaccine. The measles-mumpsrubella (MMR) vaccine protects against all 3 diseases.



Two doses of MMR vaccine provide 97% protection against measles; one dose provides 93% protection.

Virginia is one of the last states to report any measles activity. Keep you and your family safe by getting the MMR vaccine. Your Primary Care Provider or the Health department are a couple of resources for receiving the vaccine.



Bells can't ring because ...






