# Finance Committee Report

Fellow St. Martinites I wanted to give you an explanation for the large budget deficit the Church experienced in August. First we replaced the 30 year old roof on the Sanctuary for \$30,000 and second we paid half the cost of painting the exterior of the Sanctuary for \$5,000. Both of these projects had been put off because of the uncertainty created by Covid but needed to be done because we were losing shingles and were experiencing peeling paint and rotting wood. I'm pleased to say both projects were paid for from cash reserves that have actually grown during Covid and no debt was incurred.

The balance of the deficit was due to other expenses that are paid annually and also a deficit in contributions for the month of \$6,790 that is not unusual for a summer month. I'm sure we will make up this lost ground with vacations over and parishioners catch up on their pledge commitments during the fall.

# Sunday School and Children's Resources

Sunday School has gotten off to a great start this program year with some tweaks and new resources available to our youngest members. On Sunday mornings at the 10:00 a.m. service the children are invited forward in Church for the children's sermon. Afterwards children go for the Sunday lesson and return to worship for Holy Eucharist. For the beginning of this year we have been using the Episcopal Relief and Development VBS curriculum *The Abundant Life Garden Project*. Starting in mid-October we'll be using *The Deep Blue Rotation Stations* curriculum which present the lessons in weekly formats that include Art, Cooking, Science, Storytelling, Games, Missions, and Spiritual Practices.

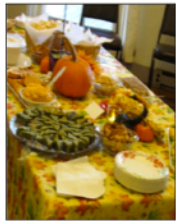
You may have also noticed a few new elements in worship. Over the summer we began offering Children's Worship Bulletins for ages 3+ and 7+ along with crayons and markers during worship. In October we will be adding Children's Activity Bags that includes Arch Books (my favorite as a child was *The Good Samaritan*) and other worship related activities that encourage children to interpret and share what they are seeing, hearing, and experiencing in services.

We worship together in daily sessions, explore various issues, and participate in one or two session workshops (each session is an hour and a half) on a variety of topics. We always have a keynoter, a chaplain and our folk theologian, Ed Kilbourne, who leads us musically and tells amazing stories.

In addition to the scheduled activities, there is plenty of time to sit on the porches, visit with friends, relax, enjoy the amazing scenery, and

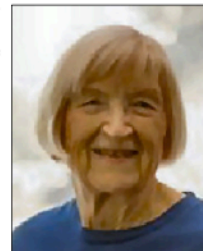

# Parish Nurse by Betty Horne

## October is Breast health month.

The female breasts are a collection of fatty tissue and glands, responsible for making, storing and delivering milk after a pregnancy. They respond to hormones such as estrogen and progesterone. When milk is needed it flows through special ducts to the outside via the nipple.

Under your arms are many lymph nodes which allow excess fluid to drain back from the breast and arm to the blood stream. These lymph nodes play a role in fighting infection. However breast cancer could spread to other parts of the body through lymph nodes.

Many women experience breast changes. This can occur with age, hormone levels and medicines you may take. Most are not life threatening, but some changes can be caused by serious problems. It is important to seek medical advice if you notice any changes in your breast. Some women do regular breast self-exam to check for lumps and changes. This makes it easier to find any changes in the breast. Unfortunately men can also get breast cancer and because this diagnosed is least expected, it may go undiagnosed for a while.

### Common Causes of Breast Changes include:

- Fibrocystic breast—painful, lumpy breasts are likely caused by hormone changes that occur during the menstrual cycle.

- Cysts—fluid filled lumps. They often get bigger and painful just before the start of your menstrual cycle.
- Fibro adenomas—hard round lumps that may feel like a marble. They move around easily and are usually painless. They are more common in young women less than 30 years old.



• Intraductal papilloma—wart like growths in the milk duct of the breast, found closer to the nipple. There may be clear, sticky, or bloody drainage from the nipple. You may feel a lump or pain.

• Mastitis—caused by a blocked or clogged milk duct. The breast may look red and feel lumpy, warm and tender. This is sometimes seen in nursing mothers.

- Milk production when a woman is not breast feeding
- Injury to the breast.

**See your physician as soon as you notice any breast changes.  
Better to be safe than worry.**

If you perform regular breast self-exam you may be the first to detect a lump in or near your breast or under your arm. Changes in your breast may include:

- Thick or firm breast tissue, change in shape or size of your breast.

- Changes in the size, shape or direction of the nipple may occur. You may also notice some dimpling.
- Discharge from the nipple—any fluid that is not breast milk including blood
- Itching
- Redness
- Scaling
- Dimples
- Puckers



## Tests and diagnosis

Screening for breast disease may include:

### Breast self exam.

**Examination** by your gynecologist or healthcare provider

A **Mammogram** may be ordered at regular intervals, determined by your doctor. This can detect lumps and bumps felt on exam. This is the best way to find breast cancer early. They may detect lumps that are too small to feel on exam. If you have a family history of breast cancer your doctor may recommend mammograms earlier. **October 22 is National Mammography Day**

An **Ultrasound** of the breast may be done to learn more about changes in your breast. It can provide

information about the type of lump, whether it is a solid lump or a fluid filled cyst.

An **MRI** is a powerful magnet which takes detailed pictures of areas inside your breast. It can detect changes in the breast that may not be seen on a mammogram or ultrasound.

A **biopsy** is done to obtain a sample of the breast tissue in question. This is then examined under a microscope to find out if the tissue is cancerous.

### How can I decrease my risk for breast cancer?

- Keep a healthy weight and exercise regularly.
- Don't drink alcohol or limit your alcohol intake
- If you take hormone replacement therapy or birth control pills, ask your provider about the risks.
- Breastfeed your children if possible.
- If you have a family history of cancer talk to you provider about other ways to lower your risks.

***The important thing is to remember to contact your doctor if you notice any changes in your breast. The earlier it is evaluated may make the difference in your life.***
