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# Father Lee Hutchson



In the time of Covid and hand sanitizer it might seem strange to see a church full of people drink out of a common cup. Won't I get sick or spread something on to someone else?

Sharing the common cup is not as hazardous as you think. Hands are a preferred path for spreading germs as are airborne viruses as the flu.

The real wine used in our case is a port wine. A Canadian doctor, David Gould, did research into illness passed through a common cup and found that church goers were most likely to get sick from an airborne infection.

If you still feel uncomfortable drinking the chalice this is not essential to receiving communion. We believe that Christ is equally present in both the blessed bread and wine. So, receiving one assures you of receiving the presence of Christ in the Sacrament.

So, feel free to come up and receive the bread then cross your arms to have the chalice pass you by. Or come forward to receive a blessing. With that being said we still offer the small chalices for those who prefer to receive communion in that way.

As Covid spreads through the air, masks are always an option to wear during worship.



### Monkeypox

There has been much in the news recently about the monkeypox virus. The World Health Organization (WHO) and the Center for Disease Control (CDC) are tracking the spread of this virus. As at the time of this article, the CDC reports 44 known cases in Virginia. We see people in the news lining up for vaccines to prevent infection, mostly men, as the infection rate is higher in men having intimate contact with men. The following is some information on the monkeypox virus.

#### **About monkeypox**

Monkeypox is a rare disease caused by infection with the monkeypox virus.

Monkeypox virus is part of the same family of viruses that causes smallpox.

Monkeypox symptoms are

similar to smallpox symptoms, but milder, and monkeypox is rarely fatal. Monkeypox is not related to chickenpox.

MONKEYPOX VIRUS

Monkeypox was discovered in 1958 when two outbreaks of a pox-like disease occurred in colonies of monkeys kept for research. However, African rodents and non-human primates (like monkeys) might harbor the virus and infect people.

The first human case of monkeypox was recorded in 1970. Prior to the 2022 outbreak, monkeypox had been reported in people in several central and western African countries. Previously, almost all monkeypox cases in people outside of Africa were linked to international travel to countries

where the disease commonly occurs or through imported animals. These cases occurred on multiple continents.

#### How monkeypox is spread

Monkeypox spreads in different ways. The virus can spread from person-to-person through:

- direct contact with the infectious rash, scabs, or body fluids
- respiratory secretions during prolonged, face-to-face contact, or during intimate physical contact, such as kissing, cuddling, or sex
- touching items (such as clothing or linens) that previously touched the infectious rash or body fluids
- pregnant people can spread the virus to their fetus through the placenta

It's also possible for people to get monkeypox from infected animals, either by being scratched or bitten by the animal or by preparing or eating meat or using products from an infected animal.

Monkeypox can spread from the time symptoms start until the rash has fully healed and a fresh layer of skin has formed. The illness typically lasts 2-4 weeks. People who do not have monkeypox symptoms cannot spread the virus to others. At this time, it is not known if monkeypox can spread through semen or vaginal fluids.

#### Signs/symptoms of monkeypox include:

- Fever
- Headache
- Muscle aches and backache
- Swollen lymph nodes
- Chills

- Exhaustion
- A rash that can look like pimples or blisters that appears on the face, inside the mouth, hands, feet, chest, genitals, or anus.

The rash goes through different stages before healing completely. The illness typically lasts 2-4 weeks. Sometimes, people get a rash first, followed by other symptoms. Others only experience a rash.

#### Prevention

- Avoid close, skin-to-skin contact with people who have a rash that looks like monkeypox.
  - Do not touch the rash or scabs of a person with monkeypox.
  - Do not kiss, hug, cuddle or have sex with someone with monkeypox.
  - Do not share eating utensils or cups with a person with monkeypox.
- Do not handle or touch the bedding, towels, or clothing of a person with monkeypox.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- In Central and West Africa, avoid contact with animals that can spread the virus, usually rodents and primates. Also, avoid sick or dead animals, as well as bedding or other materials they have touched.

If you are sick with monkeypox:

- Isolate at home
- If you have an active rash or other symptoms, stay in a separate room or area away from people or pets you live with, when possible.

#### **Treatment**

There are no treatments specifically for monkeypox virus infections. However, monkeypox and smallpox viruses are genetically similar, which means that antiviral drugs and vaccines developed to protect against smallpox may be used to prevent and treat monkeypox virus infections.

Antivirals, such as tecovirimat (TPOXX), may be recommended for people who are more likely to get severely ill, such as patients with weakened immune systems.

#### Vaccination

CDC recommends vaccination for people who have been exposed to monkeypox and people who are at higher risk of being exposed to monkeypox, including:

- People who have been identified by public health officials as a contact of someone with monkeypox
- People who may have been exposed to monkeypox, such as:
  - People who are aware that one of their sexual partners in the past 2 weeks has been diagnosed with monkeypox
  - People who had multiple sexual partners in the past 2 weeks in an area with known monkeypox
- People whose jobs may expose them to the virus such as:
  - Laboratory workers who perform testing for orthopoxviruses
  - Laboratory workers who handle cultures or animals with orthopoxviruses
  - Some designated healthcare or public health workers
