If you have had the opportunity to watch our compline service online you noticed that the Nunc Dimittis is always said near the end of the service. Nunc Dimittis are Latin words which mean Now depart. The church has used these words in worship since the 4th century. In the Lutheran church it's said by the congregation after receiving communion. If you saw the funeral of Margaret Thatcher the late prime minister of Great Britain; as her body was carried from the cathedral the choir sang "now your servant may depart in peace for mine eyes have seen the savior." Her life had reached its long wait to be united with Christ.



The words of the Nunc Dimittis were first spoken by a man named Simeon. Simeon had been told by God that he would not die until he had seen Israel's messiah. He had waited for years and happened to be in the temple in Jerusalem as Mary brought Jesus in to dedicate Him as God's possession. The Holy Spirit prompted Simeon that this infant was the messiah to which Simeon responded. "Lord you now have set your servant free to go in peace as you have promised: For these eyes of mine have seen the savior, whom you have prepared for all the world to see: A light to enlighten the nations, and the glory of your people Israel."

As we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ, let us remind ourselves of Simeon's words "my eyes have seen the savior." We may have peace in the midst of a chaotic world knowing that God has already raised Jesus from the dead and we too will share in his resurrection.

Get to know your brothers and sisters in Christ

Q: Are you a cradle Episcopalian?

The last few years I worked in Adult Protective Services which was very fulfilling and rewarding. I loved my job and had a hard time retiring. However, I now enjoy reading, playing bridge, traveling and walking. I have participated in many activities and on many Committees at St. Martin's and enjoy the fellowship at our church.

The Mundane and Miraculous

During the season of Lent, we are called to prepare, reflect, sacrifice, and repent, all in anticipation of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Death and resurrection: One is mundane and commonplace, and the other is an absolute miracle and extraordinary.

It's easy to focus on the miraculous aspects of Easter! At Easter we celebrate that through the awesome power of God, Jesus conquered sin and death once and for all. We celebrate that through the incredible love and sacrifice of our Savior, who gave His life, we receive eternal life and salvation. These miracles embody the most significant event in the Christian faith.

But even as we celebrate the miraculous nature of our faith, we're also reminded of the importance of the mundane. The majority of a person's life is filled with ordinary days and unremarkable experiences. When a person's life is reflected on, it is usually in the context of the significant events of their life. We celebrate and remember the special achievements and successes, the births and birthdays, graduations, weddings, new jobs, promotions, moving somewhere new, buying a home, trips, vacations, holidays, etc. The business of life pales in comparison to the grandeur of the big life events and celebrations. But it is the business of life and on our most normal of days that God works His greatest miracles.

God did not embrace humanity as a bolt of lightning, a bodiless voice, or an angel. He drew us in with someone like us, a man sent to be born, live, and die as a human. Jesus, the man, became a miracle, the extraordinary. Likewise, we too are able to be transformed.

In the life of Jesus, we see His most important miracles performed in the context of the everyday. He healed the sick, fed the hungry, showed compassion for others, taught people about the importance of love and forgiveness, and cared for the poor and marginalized—all of which He did in the midst of the ordinary routines of life. How many times have we taken care of someone who was sick, served a meal, made a new friend, or even brought beverages to a party? It is in the mundane we can look for the miraculous. And during the season of Lent, that is precisely what God asks of us. We may not experience dramatic confirmations of faith or supernatural events, but we can still experience the transforming power of God in the ordinary parts of life.

When we practice self-discipline through sacrifices of daily comforts, enjoyments, and habits, we do this as a way of acknowledging God and His grace. When we read Scripture, pray, and meditate, we do so as a means of opening ourselves up to the presence of God in our lives. When we serve others, and put the needs of others before our own, we learn how to live more fully in the spirit of what Christ taught us. And when we approach even the most mundane aspects of life with an attitude of gratitude and filled with the joy of our faith, we allow God to work in and through us in powerful ways.

So as we continue our journey through the season of Lent, let us not overlook the importance of the mundane. Embrace the ordinary moments of life as opportunities to experience the extraordinary. Greet each day with a spirit of faith and gratitude, knowing God is transforming and working a miracle within us, even in the most average of tasks or on the most typical of days.

In his Wednesday Sermon: Fifth

Week in Lent Fr. Lee talks about John Keble, Priest and Poet, who the church celebrates on that day, March 29.

John Keble brought liturgical traditions (like vestments, candles, etc.) which were used before the Reformation, back in use. He thought they were very important but it was very controversial at the time.

He wrote a book of poems for each Sunday in the year. Here is the one for Palm Sunday.

And he answered and said unto them, I tell you that, if these should hold their peace, the stones would immediately ery out, S. Luke xix, 40.

April is Foot Care month

Spring is officially here although we have had a relatively warm winter with some days as warm as 60-70 degrees. You may have seen people already wearing sandals! It is very important to keep your feet healthy.

Can you believe that by the age of 50 most Americans will have logged 75,000 miles on their feet! To be able to do this well we must take care of our feet. Anyone with foot problems know that if your feet are not healthy the rest of you just don't feel well. Regular foot care can make sure your feet are up to the task. With proper inspection, care and treatment when necessary, most foot problems can be lessened or prevented. The following are some helpful tips:

- Inspect your feet daily
- Wash your feet daily and dry carefully especially between your toes.
- Seek medical care early if you injure your foot.
- Have your feet checked by your doctor at least once a year especially if you have diabetes - more often if you have foot problems.



- Your doctor should provide you with information on foot care
- Look at your feet for red spots, cuts, swelling, or blisters.
- If you cannot see the bottoms of your feet, use a • mirror or ask someone for help.
- Because people with diabetes are more prone to foot • problems, a foot care specialist, podiatrist, may be on your health care team
- Your podiatrist can also trim corns or calluses
- Call or see your health care provider if you have an ingrown nail.
- Tell your podiatrist if your foot changes color, shape, or just feels different. e.g. pain or decrease sensation
- Your podiatrist can also trim your toenails if you cannot do so safely.

If you have diabetes the following are specifically important.

- Work with your health care • team to keep your blood glucose in your target range.
- Check your feet every day. Set a time every day to check your feet,
- Exercise (walk) for at least 20 minutes daily.
- Plan your physical activity program with your health team.

- If you need special shoes, your doctor may help you as this may be covered by Medicare
- Rub a thin coat of skin lotion over the tops and bottoms of your feet, *not between your toes*. This will help keep your skin smooth and decrease cracking.
- Trim your toenails straight across and file the edges with an emery board or nail file.(If you are able to reach)
- Never walk barefoot. Wear socks and comfortable shoes that fit well and protect your feet.
- Check inside your shoes before wearing them. Make sure the lining is smooth and there are no objects inside.
- Protect your feet from heat and cold.
- Wear shoes at the beach or on hot pavement. Don't put your feet into hot water.
- Test water before putting your feet in it just as you would before bathing a baby.

- Never use hot water bottles, heating pads, or electric blankets. You can burn your feet without realizing it.
- Put your feet up when sitting. Wiggle your toes and move your ankles up and down for about 5 minutes a couple of times a day.
- Do not cross your legs for long periods of time.
- If you smoke quit.
- It is never too late to start taking good care of your feet.

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By using the above listed recommendations you will be well on your way to healthy, happy feet this spring and summer!
