


60 Years ago ...

... Episcopalians gathered in the cafeteria of Tucker high school for the first worship service of the church plant known as Saint Martins. A year later our church was built. For the last 60 years faithful Christians have gathered here to support this colony of heaven. As a Christian you know about having a personal relationship with God. You may see yourself as a friend of God or God as your spiritual father or perhaps a teacher. The Bible uses the word covenant to describe one's relationship with God. A covenant is a partnership with God Working with God to accomplish a goal. God originally created humans to partner with God to care for Gods creation. The first humans chose to go their own way. 4 other convents are talked about in the Old Testament where God made promises to people in return for various commitments on their part. All failed because humans were unable to stay committed to God.

Later prophets came to talk about a new covenant, one written on people hearts. Jesus said that he was the fulfillment of that new covenant which the prophets spoke about. Jesus invites all people into a partnership to restore Gods creation and human race in their relationship with God. Saint Martins has been a part of that invitation these last 60 years. I hope you can take part in the activities planned for that weekend of October 13,14, and 15th especially our worship service and lunch on Sunday as we give thanks for Gods blessing on our lives and recommit ourselves to partner with Jesus to create a world that reflects the grace and love of our God.





My earliest memory of church was attending a rural Wesleyan Methodist church in Northwest Oklahoma with my grandparents. I also attended a Disciples of Christ church in Alva, Oklahoma, my home town, with my grandmother while I was in elementary school. However, the most influential church experience I had when I was young, came from a Methodist church in Hardtner, Kansas, which I also attended with my grandparents. I was baptized at the Methodist Church In Alva when I was in High School.

After graduating from Alva High School, I went to Oklahoma City University, a college affiliated with the Methodist church. I then attended Perkins School of

Theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, TX, for seminary education and was ordained as a Methodist Pastor and Campus Minister. I served in multiple Methodist churches and as campus minister for almost 20 years.

In 1984, I was ordained Priest in the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Oklahoma and served multiple churches in northwestern Oklahoma. Martha and I were married in 1995 and moved to Dalhart, TX, which is in the Diocese of Northwest Texas. I was rector of St. James Episcopal Church and Martha, who is a Physical Therapist, was the Director of Rehabilitation for the hospital there. I retired in 2010 from the Diocese of West Texas, where I had been rector of St. Francis by the Lake Episcopal Church, Canyon Lake.

Martha and I have five children, and nine grandchildren between us. They live In Richmond, VA; Dover, NH; Dundas, MN; and Dallas, TX; We moved to Glen Allen in December 2022 and attended several churches near our home. We decided that St. Martins was a good choice for us as we liked the size of the church, but especially the diversity, friendliness, and the dedication to outreach.

Martha has been a Physical Therapist for over 40 years, working in direct care, management, and as a professor in a PT school in Austin, TX. October is Health Literacy Month

The importance of Health Literacy

Health literacy will affect each of us at some point in our lives. It will be important to be able to find, understand and use health information. Even in our daily life - how we manage our health, receive and understand information from our doctors and other healthcare providers is important. It can affect even the best of us who read well or understand numbers.



We can be at a loss when faced with:

- Unfamiliar medical terms or understanding how the body works.
- Interpreting statics to evaluate benefits and risks that affect their health.
- a devastating diagnosis or serious illness leaving us scared or confused.
- having a condition that requires complicated care
- Having to weigh in on issues affecting the community's health, relying on unfamiliar technical terms.

Why do we have this problem?

When organizations or others create and give health information that is too difficult to understand it becomes a health literacy problem. People are then left to figure out healthcare services with many unfamiliar, confusing or conflicting steps. This also becomes a health literacy problem.

How can we help others or ourselves?

- Never be afraid to advocate for yourself or for others.
- Ask your doctor to explain instruction or information given if you do not understand. Your life may depend on it.
- Many health care providers have brochures or hand out information in plain simple language.
- Often this information is translated into a language you understand. or there may be access to interpreters.
- Work with trusted messengers to share your information e.g. faith leaders, healthcare provider, pharmacist.

- Often someone you trust may refer you to the right source
- Nothing beats having and understanding all the information you need to make an informed consent regarding your health.



- Keep current with what is happening in your community.
- Keep current with your immunization and keep scheduled appointments with your providers.
- Stay healthy by eating more vegetables and grains and doing some form of exercise daily.

Care for our youngest members during the 10 am service will be offered as needed.


