Father Lee Hutchson

It used to be popular to make a new year's resolution. The purpose of the resolution was to make us or the lives of others better.

Perhaps the words of Matthew would make a good resolution for us as Christians. "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly father is perfect." Matt. 5:48. The word telos translated as perfect also can mean to know your purpose or live your destiny. In other words, know your purpose for living just as your heavenly father knows his purpose.



Knowing our purpose in life and living it out sure would provide clarity for our decision making. It certainly would shape our attitude towards others. As Christians we are called to reflect the generosity and grace of God when times are good and when times are bad.

This is especially important when we need to call for change in our relationships with our family and friends, we need to do it with generosity and grace. Jesus gives us 3 examples of an attitude we should have towards those relationships. Be willing to get treated worse than you deserve, be willing to give more than you are asked, and be willing to go farther than required.

Be willing to get worse than you deserve. If a person insults you do not respond with an insult but expect them to do it again. Jeus would say turn the other cheek. Do not respond in kind.

Be willing to give more than you are asked. Jesus used the example of a person asking another for a tunic(shirt). Jesus says if they ask you for a shirt give them a Cloak(jacket) as well.

Be willing to go farther than required. Jesus used the example of being compelled to carry a roman soldiers gear for a mile, which roman law allowed. Jesus said offer to carry it 2 miles.

Jesus sought to radically change our individual relationships with one another. When our individual relationships reflect the generosity and grace of God the world can change from treating others with contempt or anger or violence. What a different world that would be. How will you live your life in 2024 to reflect the generosity and grace of God.

January is national blood donor month

The month of January is designated as National Blood Donor Month in the United States. Due to holiday celebrations, inclement weather, and cold and flu season, the winter months are often a time of

reduced donations and an increased risk for blood shortages. National Blood Donor Month celebrates blood donors during this critical time and reminds people of the importance of donating blood. On December 31, 1969, President Nixon



designated January as National Blood Donor Month to honor those who have donated and to encourage people to give blood at this crucial period of the year.

Why do people donate blood?

It truly can be regarded as a selfless gift of life. People who give blood say they do it to support their local communities, hospitals, to give back after a family member needed blood or it just makes them feel good about themselves. It takes a little less than an hour to donate a unit of blood but can make a big difference to a trauma victim or someone having surgery, particularly vascular surgery. One unit of blood can be separated into 4 components and can save multiple lives.

Each unit of blood can produce **red blood cells**, **plasma**, the liquid part of the blood which can be used to improve clotting, and for burn victims as well as patients suffering from shock. **Platelets**, a third component, is also used to help with clotting, but particularly for use with cancer patients or transplant patients. These patients usually have low platelet counts. The fourth component, **cryoprecipitate** anti-hemophilic factor (AHF) is also used for some clotting factor disorders.

The blood donation process

- Locally you can donate blood to the American Red Cross and other centers such as CSL plasma and others. You will want to find your location and make an appointment.
- There may be blood drives in your area such as a community blood drive through places of work or worship. There is also the bloodmobile.
- You must be at least 16 years old and weigh at least 110 pounds.
- You will need to produce 2 forms of ID. You will be directed as to which ones.
- If you have been recently ill or travelled outside the country, you will need to let the center know.



At the center you will be given a health screening including questions about your health, lifestyle, medications you're taking, and other medical

conditions you may have. This information is confidential.

- They will do a check of your vital signs Temperature, blood pressure and pulse.
- You will have your blood checked to see if your blood count is acceptable to donate blood.
- Once you are cleared to donate, preparing the site and withdrawing the blood only takes about 10 minutes.

Care after donation

- A Pressure bandage is applied to the site at the end of the procedure.
- You will be expected to stay for a while for refreshments and observation. You may leave when you feel strong enough.
- You will be instructed to increase fluid intake (avoid alcohol, smoking) for 24 to 48 hours.

- If you feel faint or lightheaded you will be instructed to lie down. Avoid strenuous work.
- If you have some oozing at the site, apply pressure and elevate the arm for 3-5 minutes. You may apply a snug bandage.

As you can see, much of the time spent at the facility is screening and ensuring that you are safe and healthy to donate!
