Why do we Episcopalians ...?

This is a reprint from a previous issue because of "popular demand". We hope you enjoy it!

From St. Nicholas to Santa Claus



Have you ever wondered how we went from St. Nicholas to Santa Claus?

Saint Nicholas was a popular 4th century bishop from Turkey who devoted his ministry to helping the poor. The most famous story about Nicholas was his help of a couple too poor to afford dowries so their 3 daughters could marry. The night before each daughter came of age he slipped a small purse filled with gold coins into the house so that each daughter could marry.

By the middle ages, the 3 most recognized figures in Christianity were Jesus, Mary and Saint Nicholas.

Nicholas became the patron Saint of the Netherlands where he was called Sinterklass. The Dutch brought the tradition of giving to poor with them when they settled in New Amsterdam. Washington Irving who wrote the "Legend of sleepy hollow" wrote satirical articles about the Dutch in newspaper joking about their sleighs, beards and long pipes.

This is when an Episcopalian comes into the picture. Clement Moore was Episcopal bishop of NY and professor of Greek history. Around 1820 he wrote a poem for his children based on Irving's satirical stories he changed the feast day of St. Nicholas from December 6th to 25th, and added some reindeer for entertainment. A few years later his poem was published in newspapers. It was called T'was the night before Christmas. In 1890 Coca Cola bought rights to his image of Saint Nick now referred to as Santa Claus. Dressed him in red & white and we have our Santa Clause of today.

I share this with you and encourage you to be intentional about living your faith as we prepare to celebrate Christmas. Whether you are a parent, god parent, grand parent, aunt, uncle or neighbor the children in your life are dependent upon you to pass down your faith.

- Buy an Advent calendar for them.
- Set up an Advent wreath or crèche in your home.
- Adopt a child or family to help, and explain to your children it was Jesus who said "As you do to the least of these you do to me."
- Make sure some of the ornaments on your tree refer to the birth of Christ. Hang them up first or last., but make it a special event.
- Read the gospel of Luke's story of the birth of Christ.
- Talk about St. Nicholas. His feast day is still December 6.

There is a war on Christmas not waged by Starbucks but by ourselves in our own individual hearts. Be intentional about preparing to celebrate the Birth of our Savior. May you have a blessed season of Advent and a wonderful celebration of the Birth of our Savior!

Leftover Chrismons will be available to buy (\$6 to offset the cost of the material). If your teenager has graduated from 12th grade but wants to continue his/her tradition, let Christa know before Sunday to put you on top of the list.

2008 = Six-point Star of David 2009 = Fish 2010 = Butterfly 2011 = Descending Dove 2012 = Angel 2013 = Shell 2014 = Bottony Cross 2015 = Crown 2016 = Cup & Bread 2017 = Alpha & Omega



















Chrismons were first developed by Frances Kipps Spencer (1917-1990) for Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia, when she volunteered in 1957 to be in charge of decorating the church Christmas tree. She decided instead of traditional balls and colored lights,



handmade ornaments would be more appropriate. The word "Chrismon" stands for "Christ's monogram". The word Chrismon and their patterns are copyrighted.

These are my designs and patterns and they are free on the internet (<u>https://passionate-about-chrismons.blogspot.com/p/blogs.html</u>). I also research to include an explanation for each symbol. There are 27 different Symbols. I always hope for an inspiration of a new one.

My hope is that these Christian Symbol Ornaments remind us of the true meaning of Christmas and bring as much joy to friends and strangers alike as possible.

Get to know your brothers and sisters in Christ

I was very happy when **Sally Dvorak**'s answers showed up in the Cloak emails without having been directly asked. She took my note in the June Cloak to heart. Sally was the ECW communicator for some time and provided the editor with monthly articles, and quite often photos.

Q: Are you a cradle Episcopalian?

A: No. I was not baptized as a child and did not grow up in a church going family because my father was a Christian Scientist and my mother was a non church going, occasional Anglican. As a child I walked with friends to Sunday School at the Church of England until other friends persuaded me to attend the local Methodist Church.



While in college in Glasgow my Scottish friends invited me to a Presbyterian church and when I was in the working world I attended church of any denomination when and if I felt like it. But I always felt I was missing a vital element in my life.

Q: Have you always lived in the Richmond area?

A: No. I grew up in Wolverhampton, England, during and after WWII, graduated from the Scottish Hotel School in Glasgow in 1954 and subsequently held various hotel and catering jobs in Stratford on Avon, London, Salcombe and Birmingham. In 1961, after several years of non communication, my college boyfriend, Michael Potter, contacted me and suggested I join him in Bermuda. Of course I jumped at the chance to live on an island in a warm climate so I quit my job, rid myself of most of my possessions and with one suitcase flew out to a completely new life. I soon found a job as assistant manager of a guest house, Michael and I fell in love all over again and within 6 months we were married on October 4th, his 30th birthday. Our elder son, Bruce, was the only baby born in Bermuda on leap year day in 1964. Michael worked for Reynolds International, a wholly owned subsidiary of Reynolds Metals. In the summer of 1965 Reynolds transferred the International division back to Richmond. We flew into Richmond as green card carrying legal aliens and in 1967 our second son, Francis, was born an American citizen.

Q: How did you find St. Martin's?

A: In 1973 when our sons were aged 9 and 6, Michael and I decided that, although neither of us had grown up attending church, we wanted different for our children so one Sunday we visited St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church and remained there for 15 years. In 1974 Francis and I were baptized together and within a few months Bruce, who had been baptized as a baby, and I were confirmed together. It was so special to be baptized and confirmed with my children. By 1990 Michael and I were attending a large Methodist Church but didn't feel at home. Michael mentioned to a colleague at work that we were "shopping" for another small Episcopal church in the woods. That colleague was Rich Thomas. He recommended that we try St. Martin's. We loved the Anglo-Catholic tradition and the rest is history!

Q: What would you like your church friends to know about you, your family, your occupation, hobbies etc?

A: Enthused by America's bicentennial in 1976, Michael, Bruce and I became naturalized citizens the following year. So I can truthfully say "I am British by birth, American by adoption".

Michael died of cancer in December 1994. He was 63 and had recently retired. We both loved to square dance, and I promised him I would continue that friendly activity. John and June Dvorak were very active members of the same club. Sadly, June died in June 1996, aged only 53. Over the next few years, John and my friendship slowly grew into love and we were married at St. Martin's in September 1999. We believe it is truly a blessing

from God to find love a second time around.

John is a cradle Catholic and we attend St. Benedict Catholic Church on alternate weeks.

When time allows, I am a voracious reader. I enjoy exercising, particularly in a pool, and love spending time at our timeshare on the OBX. Now that we have moved to Cedarfield I miss the birds that flocked to our multiple feeders in CrossRidge. I hope to continue to provide food for the bird feeder in the Memorial Garden which was erected, in addition to the statue of St. Francis in the courtyard and a seat in the Memorial Garden, in memory of Michael whose birthday was St. Francis day.

Thanks be to God for all the blessings he has showered on my life.



Giving thanks

As we approach the holiday season, thanksgiving, and even as we look back on the year, we can find so many things to be thankful for. In a year when there is so much turmoil: disastrous hurricanes in the east, wild fires in the west and so much tragedy. It seems like there is nothing but bad news. While we are thankful for all God has blessed us with, let us remember and pray for those who are not so fortunate, doing whatever we can to help. This December I thought I would revisit an article I wrote many years ago on being thankful.

Did you know that counting your blessings can increase your emotional health? The following are documented benefits of giving thanks.

- Giving thanks promotes health and well being. Researchers have studied 3 groups of students: one group listed what they were grateful for, the other listed what they were angry about and the third made random lists. The group who listed what they were grateful for was the happiest at the end of the experiment. What was even more interesting was that the students who expressed gratitude were less likely to be sick throughout the semester. "Thanks be to God for his in expressible gifts, 2 Corinthians 9:15"
- 2. Being grateful increases your blessings. We take for granted the blue skies, the beautiful sunset, the flowers and the bountiful harvest. The more we notice all the beauty of nature and give thanks for all we enjoy, including our freedom, the more blessed we seem to be! "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to the Father through him" Colossians 3:17

- 3. The consequences of not being grateful. "And when the people complained, it displeased the Lord: and the Lord heard it" Numbers 11:1. People who are not grateful tend to complain, mostly about anything or everything! We can make that choice to have a grateful heart (an attitude of gratitude). Think of the benefits!
- 4. Gratitude keeps us continually aware that the Lord is close by. It motivates us to look for His purpose in our circumstances. Thanking God focuses our attention on Him rather than our circumstances.
- 5. Thankfulness is an essential ingredient for joy. Gratitude transforms anxiety into peace, which passes all understanding. Be fearful for nothing, but in everything with prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God which passes all understanding will keep your heart and mind through Jesus Christ our Lord. Philippians 4:6-7


