Father Lee Hutchson

Years ago, I shared a story of being stranded on the rim of a canyon we had climbed to the top of to see the sunset. However, clouds quickly moved, the temperature plummeted, the wind began to blow, and it quickly became too dark to get down. Our leader insisted on trying to get down in the dark, but he fell and was injured. There were only a few scrubby bushes to protect us from the wind. We huddled together covered by a trash bag one of us had in our pockets. It was so Cold. Shivering from the cold, about 2 in the morning we prayed for some kind of sign we would make it till morning...praying it would be great if a flashlight or beam of light would suddenly appear to help us get off of the canyon rim. We finished our prayer.



No beam appeared from the heavens, and no flashlight appeared. However, a few moments later, a light across the canyon and many, many miles away turned on. It was transformative for us. Our attitudes changed in that it somehow seemed warmer. The light could not help us get down, but it gave hope and that hope gave us the courage to meet our challenge and carried us through the night. Light of hope, whether in our possession or not, inspires one's soul even if you must wait.

John contrasts the power of light and darkness throughout his Gospel. In describing the incarnation of Jesus, he wrote, "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it." The focus of Easter has never been on egg hunts. It has always been about finding a way out of the darkness. As John began his Cospel describing Jesus as light in a dark world, he brings his Gospel to a close with the resurrection of Jesus with the words, "While it was still dark Mary went back to the tomb." Mary did not go back when the bright warmth of the sun was shining. While it was still dark, she went to the tomb. When we are in some need in our life, we like to move ahead. It seems counterintuitive to look back, yet Mary went back to the last place she had seen Jesus which happened to be at one of the lowest points in her life. Meister Eckhart, a priest, theologian, and mystic, wrote a lot about finding inner peace for one's soul. He wrote, "If you want to find God you have got to go back to where you lost him." Many people believe they will find God in the future when the conditions are just right like when "I finally get my life together." Yet, God has never been about waiting to love us until we get our life together, for it was while we were still imperfect that Christ died for us. When your prayers do not seem to connect and when your life is filled with anxiety or heartache while life seems dark, go back to where you last knew God.

Because Mary went back to the tomb, Mary found that the stone covering the grave had been moved away. Then the Risen Jesus spoke to Mary by name, proving he was alive. It is in the darkness that the light of the resurrection shines its brightest. When we discover that God stands with us in the darkness...that is transformational. It gives us the strength to be faithful. If darkness is encroaching upon you, go back to the tomb or go back to when you last saw Jesus in your life and discover the risen Christ.

The transformative power of Easter finds its power when you and I share our stories with others and light their path through the darkness.

Words from Rev. Dr. Sandra Levy-Mix

"Alexei Navalny Speaks From the Grave"

Some of you know that for the better part of a year, I spent my afternoons slowly reading the prison diary collected and published last year by Navalny's widow, Julia Navalny. (*Alexei Navalny Patriot: A Memoir*, Alfred A. Knopf, 2024). It's a very big book, and I only could read four or five pages at a sitting. At the end of the work, there is an Epilogue that I wanted to share with you–the essence of his final words.

If you remember the story beginning in 2020 while on a plane headed for Russia, Navalny was suddenly stricken with the effects of poisoning that had been ordered and carried out by Putin's men. After nearly dying and then treated in a German hospital, Navalny decided nevertheless that he would return to Russia to fight against the unjust authoritarian government run by "thrives and rogues." He was immediately arrested when his plane landed in Russia—his home country that he was determined to save.



He was placed in severe prison conditions for four years after trial after trial on trumped up charges, and he finally died in a prison above the Arctic Circle on one cold day as he walked out to exercise. Apparently he knew he was going to die—he hadn't been well for some time and he could not receive any real medical care. So in the Epilogue, he describes two techniques he had worked out for living as well as he could to the end.

His first technique was to imagine the worst thing that could now happen. "The important thing is not to torment yourself with anger, hatred, fantasies of revenge, but to move instantly to acceptance. Instead of yelling, you need to think about the situation calmly. So what if that worst thing comes to pass? Worse things happen."

The second technique is religion. Turns out Navalny was a devout Russian Orthodox, and he asserts that "faith makes life simpler." He asks, "Do you believe in the immortality of the soul? If so, then don't worry about the morrow. Because the morrow is perfectly capable of taking care of itself."

And Navalny ends his memoir with these words from the grave: "My job is to seek the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and leave it to good old Jesus and the rest of his family to deal with everything else. They won't let me down and will sort out all my headaches. As they say in prison here, they will take my punches for me."

And shortly after that, this courageous man took a walk in the arctic cold, and died without family or friends, but sustained by Jesus and his family to the end. And so, let us pray that we all may be sustained at the end of our days in this life.

April 30th is Therapy Animal Day

National Therapy Animal Day occurs every April 30th. It is an opportunity to recognize, celebrate and honor the amazing work of therapy animals and their handlers in communities across the country and around the world. These handlers volunteer their time and compassion to brighten the lives of those in their community by sharing their special pet. This is also an opportunity to consider if becoming a therapy animal team is right for you.



How does this work?

Therapy animals can provide physical, psychological, and emotional benefits to those they interact with. Most frequently, they are dogs but can include cats, rabbits, and horses to name a few. They can be seen in healthcare settings, assisted living facilities, schools and in the community. They are evaluated on their ability to safely interact with people, and their

handlers are also trained to effectively ensure that interactions are safe for both the animal and those they interact with.

Therapy animals can be seen in hospitals and in a dentist's office to soothe a frightened child. They can be seen in a classroom at school or a reading program at a library. Therapy animals can also be seen at community events where people can pet the animals and learn more about therapy animals and volunteering. You may also see these animals after a traumatic event such as a school shooting or after a natural disaster. Often, veterans suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), can be seen with a dog helping to improve health and wellbeing. They are so important in providing support, empathy and kindness in whatever setting they may be found and with those they interact.


And this was offered:




