Measles

There has been much about Measles in the news recently. It is a highly contagious virus which is spread through the air when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks, releasing tiny droplets containing the virus. It is of great concern, particularly in parts of our country where childhood vaccinations are lowest. In the year 2000, measles was thought to be eliminated. To date, in 2025 measles outbreaks have been reported in multiple states. This is concerning as continued spread will result in an increase in hospitalizations and deaths. The best way

to prevent contracting measles is through measles vaccination. It is also the best way to protect people who cannot get the vaccine, such as babies or people with weakened immune

systems, e.g. cancer.


Thinking that measles is just a nuisance rash and fever that will clear up in a few days can result in serious consequences, especially in children under five years old. It is estimated that if one person is positive for measles, nine out of 10 people around this person will become infected if not vaccinated.

Measles vaccine is part of the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccines usually given in childhood. It provides long-lasting protection against all strains of measles.

Symptoms appear a week to two weeks after contact with the virus and may include:

- High fever (as high as 104 degrees or more)
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Red, watery eyes
- Rash

Measles rash appears three to five days after the first symptoms. It begins as flat red spots that appear on the face



Two or three days after the start of symptoms, tiny white spots (Koplik spots) may appear inside the mouth.



Common complications from measles are:

- Ear infections occur in one of ten children with
- Diarrhea reported in less than one in ten people with measles.
- Pneumonia 1 out of 20 children will get pneumonia -common cause of death.

- Encephalitis (swelling of the brain) -1 out of 1000 children will develop this, causing convulsions, loss of hearing or intellectual disability.
- Hospitalization -1 in 5 unvaccinated persons will be admitted.
- Death 1-3 of every 1000 children will die from respiratory or neurological complications.

Measles can be serious in all age groups. However, there are several groups that are more likely to suffer from measles complications. They include:

- Children younger than 5 years of age
- Adults older than 20 years of age
- Pregnant women may have premature or low birth weight babies if unvaccinated.
- People with weakened immune systems e.g., leukemia, HIV infection

The Virginia Department of Health was notified of a confirmed case of measles at Washington Dulles International Airport and the Washington Area Metro on June 8. The health officials are coordinating contact tracing and trying to identify people who may have been exposed. We currently have 3 confirmed cases in Virginia. There have been more than 900 cases nationwide.



Take good care of yourselves and the ones you love by reviewing your immunization records. Have a conversation with your healthcare provider about your vaccination status, whether he recommends vaccination.

Words from Rev. Dr. Sandra Jevy-Mix

"Prison Fellowship"

One of the charities that I have supported for years is called Prison Fellowship.

Now call me a softie or call me naive, but I do believe that no one is beyond redemption. And some of the folks on the receiving end of this charity have done some really bad things. Some incarcerated for years if not decades. In fact, most of their life. But humans, capable of reflection and at least inward change and again, in Christian terms, open to redemption.

I recently received in the mail a volume of testimony written by some of the prisoners who have responded to the support offered by this fellowship, and several of them are quite moving. Allow me to share a couple of quotes with you from this volume, and I think you will see what I mean.

The first one is from a young woman who writes this testimony titled "Surrender It To God":

I was serving time in jail by the time I was 18. But something different happened during my last time behind bars. It's always been hard for me to pray and "give it to the Lord" or "let go and let God" as the sayings go, but one day I did!

I was listening to Christian songs when one of the songs affected me. A feeling came over me, and I started to cry.

That's when I got down on my knees and for the first t ime, I cried out to God saying "I surrender, I surrender. Help me Jesus!"

God hasn't given up on me. He has chosen me to show others who are still struggling that they can have a new life. All they have to do is surrender. "You can start a new life with Him!"

PRISON FELLOWSHIP

The second one is titled "God Will Never Forsake Us":

Jail or Prison is a trial for those of us behind bars. Trials come at us from all directions: drugs, fights, sins, stress, guilt, shame. . . and peer pressure can easily draw away from God daily.

These are trials we have to face. But there is light at the end of the tunnel! Whatever we face, God will never abandon us. He will provide a way out so we can bear our time separated from society. . . .

No trial has been too much for me to face because God has always been present. No matter what life throws at me, I can bear it, because God is faithful and never abandon me.
