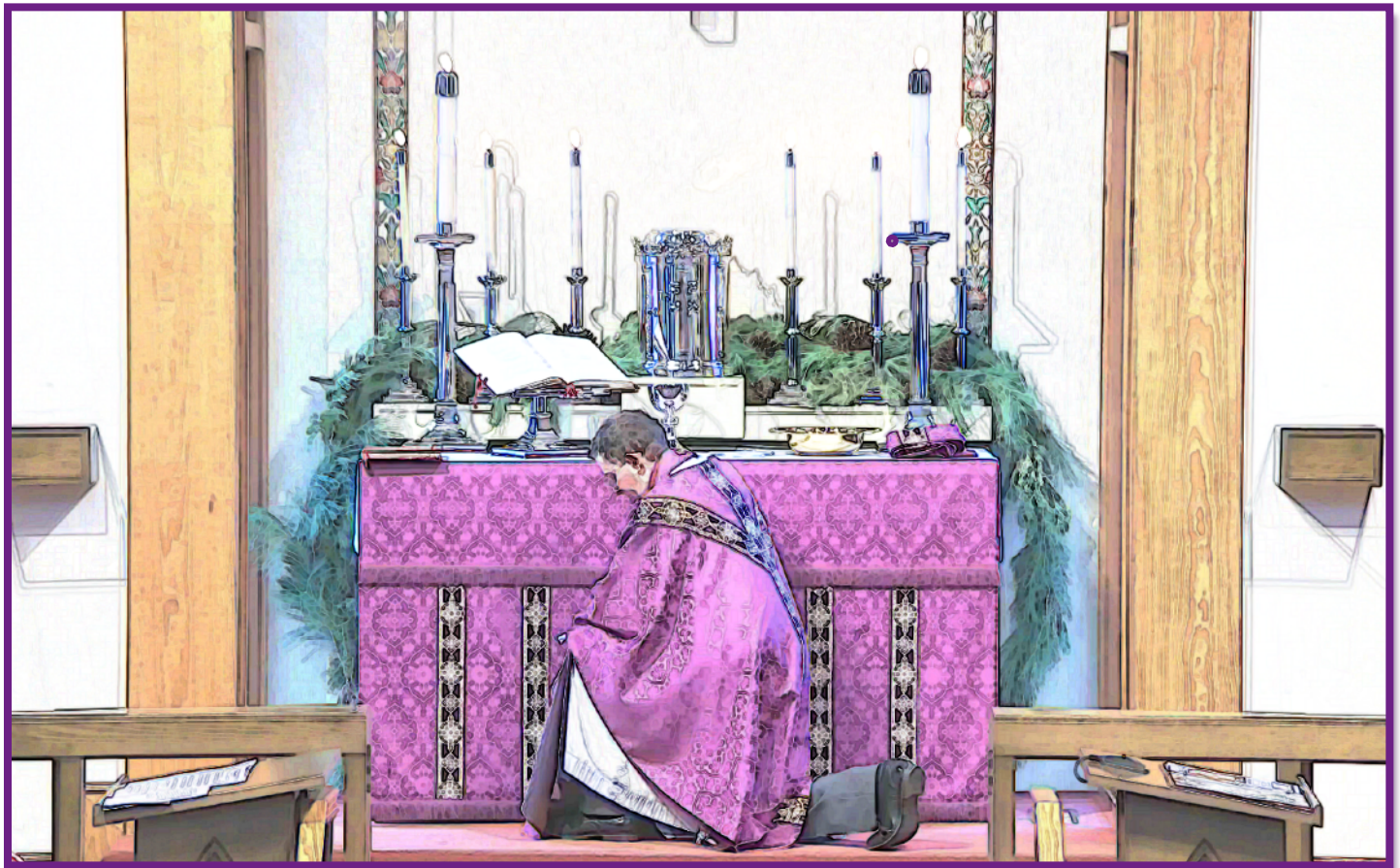

Question: Are you a cradle Episcopalian?

Q: What would you like your church friends to know about you, your family, your occupation, your hobbies, etc?

My life has completely shifted in that way, whereas before, I just sought to do good deeds and be a good person. Now faith and obedience serve at the forefront.

I have worked in mental health and crisis management for the majority of my career. I have had patients overdose, unalive themselves, induce suicidal and homicidal ideations/attempts, etc. I call it EMS for mental health. Over the past several years, I have grown to understand that while textbook identifies behaviors with a diagnosis, there is more spiritual unrest occurring beyond what a clinician may perceive. The Lord has used me in many of these instances to pray for and pray with various patients who have extreme mental health issues. Work has become less about titles or career or money but more about being a disciplined disciple and focusing on bringing more individuals to know the Lord and his kingdom. The Lord will provide is a resounding theme in my life that no matter the outcome, the Lord will always provide.

Having a large family, 6 children in total and my husband, has its challenges, however, there's the blessing in the challenge too. Without challenge, how do we grow? I always wanted a large family since I was a young child and only child. My father's parents had 15 children, and that amazed me to date. I wanted to create my own family with the concept in mind that you don't have to look outside of yourselves for friendship or protection or community because you have one another. My greatest joy is my family and all that I have been able to create alongside my husband, Jonathan. So many milestones to come, and that's what I enjoy.

Measles Update

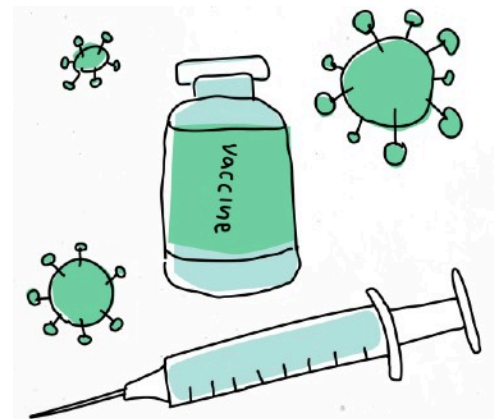
Measles was thought to be eliminated in the United States in the year 2000. Unfortunately, it has made a resurgence and has now spread across the country. South Carolina leads with almost 1000 cases where childhood vaccinations are lowest. Measles vaccine is part of the measles, mumps, and rubella vaccines given in childhood. Measles is highly contagious, spread through the air when an infectious person coughs, sneezes, or talks, releasing tiny droplets containing the virus. Measles vaccine is the best way to



protect people from getting the disease, particularly those who cannot get the vaccine, such as babies or people with weakened immune systems.



Over the last several years, there has been great reluctance or resistance to vaccines. In addition, changes to policies from the NIH and CDC have led to mistrust and confusion about the vaccines. There are 10 cases reported in Virginia. It is estimated that for every person infected with the virus, nine of ten unvaccinated people around this



person will become infected. Please be vigilant and discuss the need for vaccines with your trusted healthcare providers. Please see the attached guidelines from the Virginia Department of Health.

Updates on Virginia Department of Health Vaccine Recommendations

Dear Colleague,

To date, VDH has now reported 10 cases of [measles in 2026](#) — twice the number of measles cases reported in all of 2025. Although the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) has not yet identified a measles outbreak or evidence of community transmission in Virginia, the recent increase in cases both in Virginia and nationally is a good reminder of the importance of vaccines in protecting our communities. As we continue our shared mission to safeguard our communities, we would like to provide the following updates and reminders regarding childhood and adolescent immunizations.

On January 5, 2026, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced significant changes to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) childhood immunization schedule. This change was made in the absence of new data or safety signals to prompt such an update. On January 26, 2026, the AAP published its [Recommended Childhood and Adolescent Immunization Schedule, US, 2026](#). The updates below reflect that VDH vaccine recommendations are clear and grounded in science, enabling informed conversations and decisions between families and their healthcare providers.

American Academy of Pediatrics 2026 Immunization Schedule

Vaccinations play a critical role in protecting the health of children, families, and communities. **VDH strongly recommends that all children in the Commonwealth be vaccinated in accordance with the [American Academy of Pediatrics \(AAP\) Recommended Child and Adolescent Immunization Schedule](#).** After thorough review of the various schedules, our agency believes that AAP's recommended schedule best reflects the existing science on how to optimally protect Virginia's children and adolescents against 18 vaccine-preventable diseases.

VDH expects healthcare providers to continue relying on their clinical training and professional judgement, and to consult information published by the [American Academy of Pediatrics](#) and the [American Academy of Family Physicians](#) when engaging in shared clinical decision-making with parents, caregivers, and patients. Vaccines remain widely accessible in Virginia and VDH expects Virginia healthcare providers to continue to offer these vaccines to children and adolescents. As you know, a healthcare provider's recommendation remains one of the most powerful factors in a person's decision to receive a vaccine.

Virginia's Vaccine Requirements for School Attendance Remain Unchanged

Please note that the minimum immunization requirements for school entrance in Virginia are outlined in the [Code of Virginia](#) and remain unchanged as compared to last school year. Additional information on school immunization requirements can also be found on our [School Immunization Requirements](#) webpage.

VDH will continue to rely on systematic and transparent review of scientific evidence to inform any future updates to immunization requirements, guidance, or practice. Thank you for your collaboration in keeping Virginia's families healthy and safe.

From a Candlemas Homily by St. Sophronius the Sophist (560-638)

Let us receive the light whose brilliance is eternal. In honour of the divine mystery that we celebrate today, let us all hasten to meet Christ. Everyone should be eager to carry a light. Our lighted candles are a sign of the divine splendour of the one who comes to expel the dark shadows of evil and to make the whole universe radiant with the brilliance of his eternal light. Our candles also show how bright our souls should be when we go to meet Christ.

The Mother of God, the most pure Virgin, carried the true light in her arms and brought him to those who lay in darkness. We too should carry a light for all to see and reflect the radiance of the true light as we hasten to meet him.

The light has come and has shone upon a world enveloped in shadows; the Dayspring from on high has visited us and given light to those who lived in darkness. This, then, is our feast, and we join in procession with lighted candles to reveal the light that has shone upon us and the glory that is yet to come to us through him. So let us hasten all together to meet our God.

The true light has come, the light that enlightens every man who is born into this world. Let all of us, my brethren, be enlightened and made radiant by this light. Let all of us share in its splendour, and be so filled with it that no one remains in the darkness. Let us be shining ourselves as we go together to meet and to receive with the aged Simeon the light whose brilliance is eternal.



Rejoicing with Simeon, let us sing a hymn of thanksgiving to God, the Father of the light, who sent the true light to dispel the darkness and to give us all a share in his splendour.

Through Simeon's eyes we too have seen the salvation of God which he prepared for all the nations and revealed as the glory of the new Israel, which is ourselves. Gentiles before, we have now become the people of God. Our eyes have seen God incarnate, and because we have seen him present among us and have received him into our arms, we are called the new Israel.

Candlemas Facts

It is a feast day celebrated on annually on February 2, marking the 40th day after Christmas.

Candlemas honors the presentation of Jesus in the Temple and the purification of Mary.

It includes the blessing of candles, which symbolizes Christ as the "light of the world."

I find the history of the Saints really interesting, so I thought it would be fun to periodically do an article on a saint. Of course, I had to start with the namesake of our parish :)

Saint Martin of Tours was born in Pannonia (modern-day Hungary) in 316; although, some sources suggest it could have been as late as 336. He was born to pagan parents and was raised in Pavia, Italy. Although he was raised pagan, he began to show interest in Christianity as young as ten, when he started attending church, and he was baptized when he was 18 years old. At age 15, he was involuntarily forced into the Roman army, per the law. Many say that he had a desire to live more as a monk than as a soldier. Despite this, he was known for being charitable and kind while in the militia. St. Martin was granted discharge from the military at age 23, after declaring his intent to follow Christ instead of fighting. After he was discharged, he became a devoted Christian disciple, missionary, and monk. He also founded the first monastery in Gaul and worked to convert the pagan community there. In 371, he was lured to Tours under the false pretense that he needed to care for a sick person, but the reality was that the people of Tours were in need of his guidance. Soon after, he was made Bishop of Tours.

Versatile Egg Bites (Christa Burr)

Ingredients:

Costco beef meatballs, defrosted and cut into bits (for the 16 Bites probably about 30)

1 cup herb-seasoned stuffing mix

top part of head of broccoli, shopped, about 2 cups

8 beaten eggs

3 cups milk (I use 2%)

1 can of 8 flaky biscuits

shredded sharp cheddar (or whatever you like as needed) about 1 Tbsp per Bite

Steps:

- Turn on oven to 375"
- Prepare the mini loaf pan by pressing slightly $\frac{1}{3}$ or $\frac{1}{2}$ from a biscuit into each mini loaf pan.
- add cheese, filling and egg-milk-mix
- bake 35 minutes

20th Annual John C. Wallace Scholarship

A few days remain to apply for the 2026 John C. Wallace Scholarship. There are two scholarships available, each for \$1500. To be eligible, a student must be a member of St. Martin's who is a high school senior, a recent high school graduate, or an adult learner. The applicant should be planning to enroll in an accredited two- or four-year community college, college or university, or a technical or vocational school in the United States for the 2026-2027 academic year. The applicant does not need to know which school they will go to at this time.



Application information can be accessed on the Community Foundation's [website](#). Applicants will complete a universal application, matching them with other scholarships for which they also may be eligible. All applications and supporting materials are submitted through the website, and they are due on or before **March 5, 2026, by 5:00 pm**.

Last year, I started to make the yearly Chrismons needed during Advent in Lent, and I wanted to do it again this year. I had trouble deciding which one to do. Sunday, Feb. 8, listening to Father Lee's sermon, the decision was suddenly made for me ... it had to be the rooster.

Help to keep it filled!



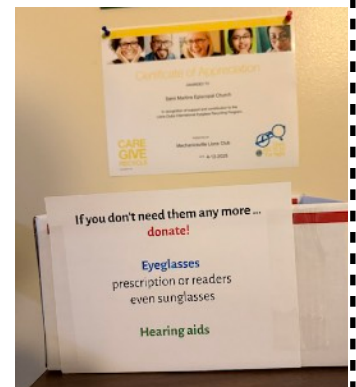
YOUR OLD EYE GLASSES & HEARING AIDS!
