Words from Rev. Dr. Sandra Levy-Mix

Learning to Meditate and Nourish Your Soul

Most of you know that I have a chair where I read and do my spiritual reflecting.

Currently, I am reading a “how-to” book on meditation titled “My Soul in Silence Waits: Meditations on Psalm 62” by Margaret Guenther. It starts with “Come Away and Rest” as the first chapter. You might get out your Bibles right now and begin the meditative practice in your own home.

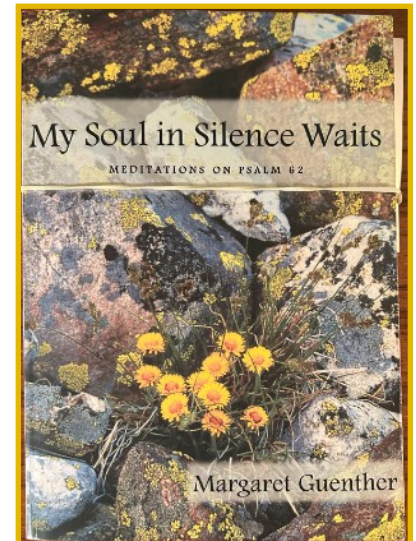
To paraphrase Ms. Guenther:

To retreat either at home or at a retreat center, this is not just self-indulgent escapism, but a practice in self-care. And she can hear you complaining that you have too much to do, too many projects on hold, too many demands on your time at work and at home. Just let me get things under control first, and then I'll take some time at meditating. The problem is that for most of us, things will never get that under control. And frankly, God may not care all that much about your busyness after all.

The rest of Guenther's charming little book examines each angle of meditation as you pray Psalm 63—like longing for God in prayer, silence, waiting for His presence, imagining, and listening for God's approach during your journey—no matter where your retreat happens to be. Let me quote a bit from her chapter on “waiting” to give you a taste of her wisdom.

After quoting a bit from the psalm “I wait for the Lord, in His word is my hope”, Guenther goes on to say the following: In other words, our waiting will not go unnoticed by God. Even when God feels distant, we feel lonely and abandoned, we are waiting in the context of His enduring love. The image of the night watchman is powerful for all who have ever sat bleakly through the darkness of a long night. We know the morning will come...since dawn has always come before. We wait patiently and in hope, but we can't be quite sure till we see the first streak of light. So we fix our eyes on the horizon and strain forward to catch the tiniest glimmer. (pg, 49-50)

Guenther's rich imagery, I believe, touches the heart of meditative prayer and is an encouraging book for all those who hunger and thirst to experience God's nearness. So I would like to encourage you to purchase this small paperback and let it guide you down this retreat path in your own home or wherever you happen to be the next time you try to take a little time to experience God and nourish your soul.

Faith and Prayer

"Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people" (Ephesians 6:13-18 NIV).



I prayed these verses over my children every morning when they were young, leaving the house for school. I couldn't be physically with them, standing as a buffer between them and the world, and it made me feel better to "at least" pray for them.

Armor, as we envision the medieval knights, was heavy and burdensome to wear. I always think of God's armor as a type of force field – invisible, but impenetrable. The evils of the world do come, and it can be hard to stand our ground against them.

The world today seems full of even more evil than it was 25 years ago! My focus then had been predominantly on them – that they wouldn't be bullied, that they would ace a test, be picked for a team, and would feel valued, safe, and happy.

Life actually was simpler then. It seemed safer, too. Don't get me wrong. There has always been evil in the world, manifested in a hundred different ways! Pick your "worldly evil" today to stand against. Then don the full armor of God. Some days, the only way we can stand firm is with the belt of truth, the breastplate of righteousness, the helmet of salvation, the sword of the Spirit, the shield of faith, and to fit our feet with readiness.

I love that Paul's final admonition is to be alert and always keep on praying. That advice is timeless!

Notes about Music

“To sing with Heart and Voice”

This quote comes from the British National Anthem and is the title of a long-running, beloved program on Classic Music Public Radio. It succinctly sums up our task in the worship of God musically.

One scholar has written that music is “the bicycle the Liturgy rides on.” Music is not an optional extra in worship. It is a key part to our Sunday observance. Whether it is in a vast and splendid church with a professional choir leading and accompanied by a huge organ or in a lowly village church with a volunteer choir and electronic organ, it is vitally important to what we are trying to express. It is sacramental, for music expresses what we cannot say with mere words. It is an outward sign of the Grace of God. We sing with joy, not necessarily accuracy, but always with Heart and Voice.

Now, the following is perhaps preaching to the choir but might bear repeating: The most important music of the Sunday Solemn Mass/Eucharist is the Ordinary of the Mass- the Five invariable parts: The Kyrie eleison; the Gloria in excelsis (except in Advent and Lent); the Credo; the Sanctus and Benedictus qui venit, and the Agnus Dei. These portions of the service have been set to some of the most glorious music ever composed - Mozart and Haydn, Bach's immortal Mass in B minor, and Beethoven's stupendous Missa Solemnis, even to Leonard Bernstein's rather different “Mass” and composers compose for it still. In major Anglo-Catholic churches, a different setting of the mass is sung 52 weeks of the year and with extraordinary settings at Christmas, Easter, and other festivals or for the Requiem Mass of All Souls Day.

After the setting of the mass, next in importance are the “Propers”- the Introit, Psalm- Gradual; Offertory sentences and Communion sentences. We could add these.

Next are the hymns- we sing normally 4 (5 in the summer months) The plot is as follows and sometimes we succeed and sometimes not quite so much: The Opening hymn/ Processional- a general hymn of praise- The Gradual/ Sequence hymn which points to the Gospel reading- the Communion Hymn which is devotional and thanksgiving to Our Lord for the precious gift of His Sacrament and the Closing hymn often called (mistakenly) ‘recessional’- a hymn encouraging us to “go on our way rejoicing” to love and serve the Lord. (Recessional actually means to walk backwards!!!)

Next is the choir's anthem and sometimes a communion motet- both are offerings of praise and thanksgiving. Our choir, in reduced circumstances, works extremely hard to make this music both meaningful and helpful to our worship.

Finally, the organ preludes, postludes, and improvisations during the service. These attempt to set a theme and mood for worship and a thoughtful departure from this Holy Place.

None of the music is ‘cover’ for actions, though the opening hymn hopes to get the sanctuary party into place. The short Children's Hymn does cover their entrance for their homily and is thus cover music, though it would be a good teaching device if the children themselves sang the hymn, too.

NONE of this is a 'performance'- they are offerings imperfect as they may be, in thanksgiving for the gift of the Divine Son and His Sacrament. (Thus, as much as it is deeply appreciated and known to be heartfelt, applause is not really appropriate – though a nod during Coffee Hour would be very gratifying).

I hope we can all join in considered prayer to enlarge our choir, especially with men, so that the next director of music will find a thriving establishment serving the Lord.

Please do make your observations- appreciations known during Coffee Hour (The 8th Sacrament) and give us your requests for hymns that we may have overlooked.

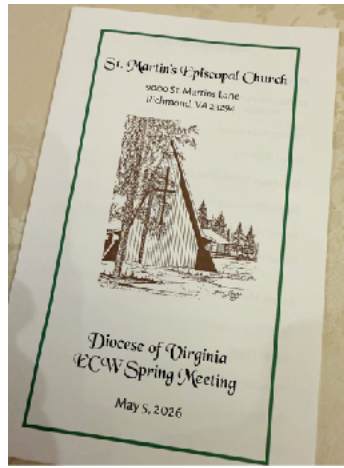
Several planning meetings and tastings were held prior to, and we set up the Parish Hall the day before.

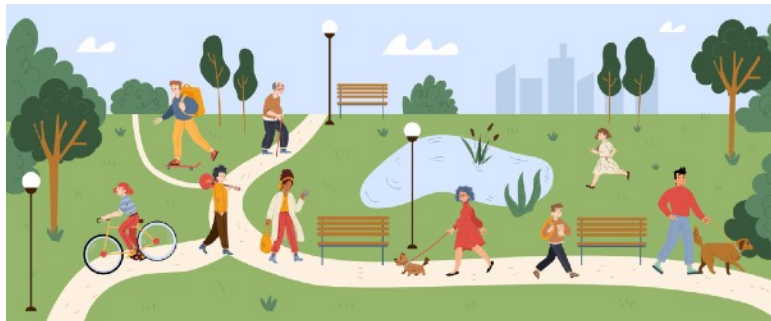

Family Health and Fitness Day

The second Saturday in June each year is celebrated as National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA) Family Health and Fitness Day. Localities are encouraged to invite families to participate in or host an event at their local park or recreation center. Events such as a health or wellness fair, a walk, or a fun run are often sponsored by a healthcare provider/facility, community, or public entity. Studies have shown that access to local parks, recreation programs, and green spaces improves our mental and physical well-being. Family Health and Fitness Day provides a great opportunity to do this.



It is estimated that more than 280 million people in the United States visited a local park or recreation facility at least once a year, and 9 in 10 people agree that parks and recreation are an important service provided by their local government.

The following are some of the benefits of access to area parks and recreation:

- People living close to parks or other recreational facilities have much higher physical activity levels for both adults and youths.

- Parks provide a connection to nature.
- There is an opportunity to learn a new skill.
- Strengthens interpersonal relationships.
- Improves mental health.
- Families moving to a new area often factor proximity to high-quality parks, playgrounds, open spaces, or other recreational facilities in choosing a place to live.

- 90 % of US adults request that parks and recreational agencies provide programs such as indoor and outdoor activities, as well as physical and educational opportunities.

• Some parks and recreation offer Out of School Time (OST). These provide childcare for working parents and caregivers, providing safety and opportunities for play, sports, physical and social activities to connect youth to peers.

- Some local park and recreation agencies provide opportunities for youth to build positive social connections to improve mental and behavioral health. This is done through the Mentoring in Parks and Rec initiative.

- During the Covid 19 pandemic, parks and other open spaces were some of the few places you could safely walk, maintaining the 6-foot distance. Walking outdoors also helped to improve your mental health.
- Parks improve the environment and help protect communities from the growing impacts of climate change, including extreme heat, flooding, poor air quality, and light pollution.

Services provided by parks and recreation may vary by state and location. These are easily available through the county or city website. This year, the United States will celebrate 250 years since the founding of our nation; as a result, there may be many military or patriotic programs scheduled throughout the year.

The following are some of the events provided through Henrico Parks and Recreation:

- Youth & Family Programs: Summer camps, after-school programs, and family recreation activities at multiple recreation centers.
- Arts & Culture: Visual arts classes, music programs (e.g., Henrico Pops Chorus), and cultural events.
- Outdoor & Nature: Hiking, nature walks, farm field days, and seasonal outdoor movie nights like Movie in the Park.
- Sports & Fitness: Group exercise classes, fitness programs, and sports leagues.
- Senior Programs: Social events, resource fairs, and activities at the Eastern Henrico Recreation Center.



- Special Events: Seasonal festivals, historical preservation events, and community celebrations.
- Conservation & Education: Youth Conservation Camps, garden talks, and Master Gardener volunteer opportunities, henrico.gov.

Examples of Specific Programs:

- VA250 Commemoration Events: Historical and cultural programs tied to the 250th anniversary of Virginia's independence, henrico.gov.
- Farm Field Day: Hands-on agricultural education and crafts at Crump Park, henrico.gov.
- Senior Party & Resource Fair: Social activities and information for older adults, henrico.gov.
- Movie in the Park: Outdoor film screenings at various parks, henrico.gov.



How to Access Programs:

- Online Registration: Available 24/7 via the Henrico Rec & Parks website or app, searchable by age, category, or location at henrico.gov.
- In-Person: At Belmont, Deep Run, or Eastern Henrico Recreation Centers for registration or facility reservations at henrico.gov.
- Permits: Required for outdoor events on park property, henrico.gov.

Most programs are free, but some require advance registration. You can view the full Spring Program Guide or browse the online calendar for current offerings at henrico.gov.

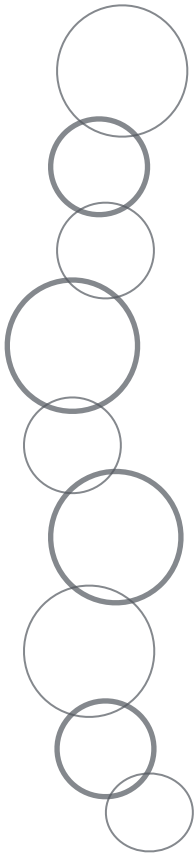

Help to keep it filled!



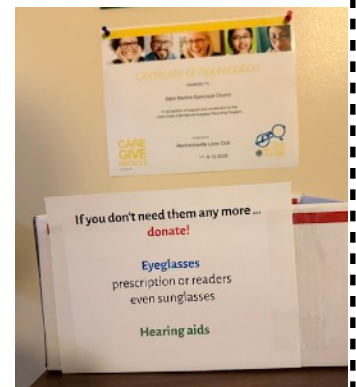
YOUR OLD EYE GLASSES & HEARING AIDS!
