The apostle Paul wrote in his letter to the church in Ephesus, "Give thanks always and for everything to God our Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" Eph 5:20.

With that in mind, I would like to say thank you once again to those who were able to give to our building campaign for the Sunday school rooms. The new HVAC system is finished, and all but three windows have been replaced. The three windows were delivered in the wrong size, and they should arrive in September.



Dr. Stephen Post has devoted his life to studying the importance of giving thanks for one's blessings and for affirming the importance of each person in your life. While doing research for his book Why Good Things Happen to Good People, he found that people who expressed their gratitude for their life and affirmed the lives of other people by showing compassion and kindness lived longer and happier lives than those who did not. His research shows what our ancestors in faith already knew: a healthy spiritual life requires us to show compassion and give thanks for all the blessings which we enjoy. Doing so is a way of expressing our love for God and other people.

500 years ago, Saint Ignatius of Loyola wrote of the importance of reflecting before bed on the blessings of the day in order to maintain a healthy spiritual life.

Dr. Post focuses on the psychological benefits of gratitude and compassion. He lists three things every person should do each day to keep one's life balanced:

- 1) Give thanks for your blessings
- 2) Be intentional about affirming your concern for the other people in your life
- 3) See each day as an opportunity to bless the life of other people.

I think the Gospel of John sums up living a life of thanksgiving and compassion when he wrote, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Words from Rev. Dr. Sandra Levy-Mix

This is about taking care of our loved ones as best we can—given that they are all deceased and in the cemetery!

A couple of Sundays ago, after church, we stopped by Fresh Market and picked up four or five bunches of beautiful fresh flowers. Most of our loved ones would have a fit if we tried to stick plastic flowers on their graves! We had with us scissors to trim the flowers and a sidewalk edge trimmer to clear weeds from the headstones.

After the headstones in the four cemetery plots were cleared, and all the flowers were distributed, we stood back and said a psalm and a couple of prayers, feeling close to our loved ones who mostly had to double up in each plot to accommodate seven of our family members. We have visited the cemetery and our loved ones as often as we can get there. Wondering, of course, who will visit us when our time comes—as it will come to all of us.



As I was thinking about this piece, an article appeared in the New York Times titled “My Summer of Haunting Cemeteries” by Will McGrath (August 23, 2026). And near the beginning of that piece, McGrath says the following: “visiting cemeteries you will feel the jittery rhythms of the modern world recede, the physiological converse of being on your phone.” Or in other words, the pleasant feeling of dropping out of our frantic everyday world to a peaceful, different plane of life.

So the point here is that when you make time to visit your loved ones in the cemetery, you not only honor them in the here and now, but you will also be rewarded with peace of mind in your own too-busy life. As McGrath ends his piece: “Death is so close. Life is everywhere. Everywhere.”

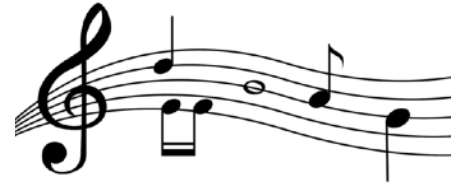
Rally Day

too lofty for me to attain.

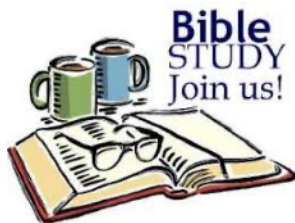

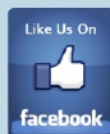

September is Sepsis Awareness Month

In 2026, Sepsis Alliance marks 15 years of Sepsis Awareness Month, an initiative to save lives through education, advocacy, and connection.

Sepsis is the leading cause of death in U.S hospitals. It affects an estimated 49 million people worldwide each year and is responsible for 11 million lives lost around the world each year. Sepsis contributes to 20% of all deaths globally and takes more lives than cancer.

Sepsis is the body's extreme, life-threatening response to an infection. During this response to an infection, widespread inflammation is triggered, leading to tissue damage, organ failure, Septic Shock, and death. It is a medical emergency requiring immediate treatment. Sepsis can be caused by bacterial, viral, or fungal infections in the lungs, urinary tract infection, gastrointestinal system, or skin (infected wounds).

Signs and symptoms of sepsis:



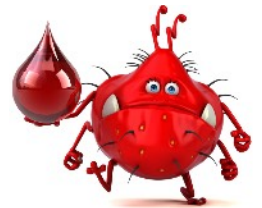
- Fever, chills, shivering, or feeling cold
- Rapid respiration or heart rate
- Confusion or disorientation
- Severe pain or discomfort
- Drop in blood pressure
- Clammy skin
- Painful urination (urinary tract infection)
- Worsening cough (pneumonia)

People with **Septic Shock** may have many of the above symptoms leading to:

- A severe drop in blood pressure
- Inability to stand
- Inability to stay awake
- Extreme confusion

Causes of sepsis

Any infection can cause sepsis, especially if not assessed and addressed, and can include infection of:



- Lungs – pneumonia
- Kidney – infection of the urinary system
- Gastrointestinal system
- Catheter sites
- Bloodstream
- Wounds or burns

People at risk include:

- Adults 65 years and older
- Infants under a year old
- People with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, lung disease, cancer, kidney disease
- People with weakened immune systems
- Long hospital stays or admission to an intensive care unit
- People with breathing tubes, IV lines, catheters, etc. can cause an infection

A **diagnosis** is made from a combination of clinical symptoms, vital signs, lab tests, and imaging.

Prompt treatment improves outcomes significantly and includes:

- IV antibiotics
- IV fluids, oxygen
- Treating the source of the infection
- Supporting failing organs such as kidney with dialysis, ventilation for respiratory failure

If you are in the group at risk for sepsis, be vigilant with any signs of infection and for any symptoms of sepsis. Prompt reporting to your healthcare provider can save you a long, grueling hospital stay and may save your life.

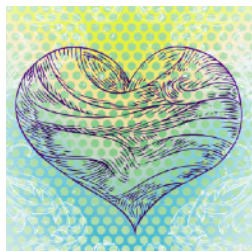
100% of what is collected goes to support innovative missions and ministries throughout The Episcopal Church and Provinces of the Anglican Communion.

Help to keep it filled!



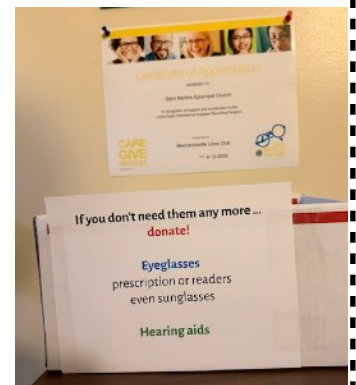
YOUR OLD EYE GLASSES & HEARING AIDS!
