Vestry Members

Our next annual meeting is November 15th. One of the primary purposes of the meeting is to elect new vestry members. Being a member of the vestry does require engagement in the life of our church family. Below are 10 expectations of vestry members. Hopefully, all members of the congregation reflect these activities. I hope you will consider standing for election to our vestry.



Expectations of Vestry Members of St. Martin's Church

1. To live daily a life reflecting the Christian faith and to strive to grow spiritually through worship, prayer, and educational opportunities both within and outside St. Martin's (i.e. Adult Education, Diocesan Conferences, etc.)
2. To regularly attend and participate in the worship of the Church, especially the Holy Eucharist.
3. To work for openness and unity among the clergy, Vestry and congregation through free and open communication and through sharing in the ministry of the Church.
4. To contribute generously to the financial support of the Church and to make an annual pledge of such support.
5. To accept the role of leadership, to work diligently and congenially at assigned tasks, and to seek ways to improve the condition of the church. To fulfill such responsibilities as are given to all Vestry persons: i.e. to attend as many special services, including funerals of parish members, as my responsibilities permit; and to attend other functions such as the Newcomers' Reception.
6. To regularly attend meetings of the Vestry and any committee to which I am assigned, to prepare notes and report committee activities to the Vestry on a regular basis and to participate in the annual Vestry Retreat and in the activities of the church.
7. To develop interest and knowledge about the affairs of this church, its structure, its operation and its relationship to Region, Diocese, National Church and the community.
8. To make both new and regular members of the congregation feel welcome through personal greetings, visits, and offers of friendship.
9. To encourage all members of the congregation to become part of the activities of the church and to attend congregational meetings.

10. To know and fulfill the duties of Vestry members according to the Canons of the Diocese of Virginia and to subscribe to the vestry Declaration and Promise as stated therein.

“I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do yield my hearty assent and approbation to the doctrines, worship and discipline of The Episcopal Church; and I promise that I will faithfully execute the office of Vestry member of St. Martin’s Episcopal Church, in Region XII, in the County of Henrico, according to my best knowledge and skill.”

- No person shall act as a Vestry member until this declaration and promise have been subscribed to.

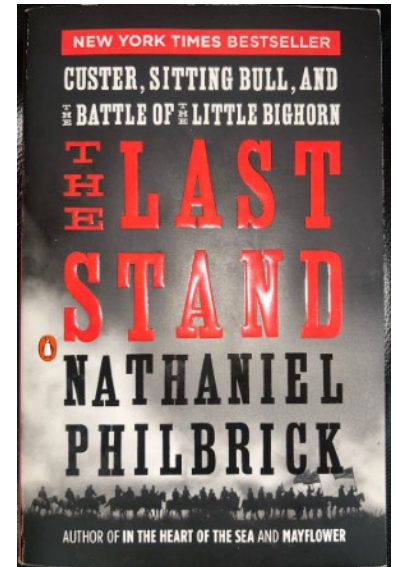
Reading Before Bedtime

David and I have been reading a historical narrative written by Nathaniel Philbrick titled The Last Stand: Custer, Sitting Bull, and the Battle of The Little Bighorn. This, of course, is the true story of various Indian tribes and American soldiers who had fought for the Confederacy during the last war. In fact, Custer had been a war hero and now was part of troops sent to beat the Indian tribes out of their land.

Philbrick is a historian and has now written a New York Times bestseller based on military dispatches and reports by eyewitnesses who were there during the bloody fighting by the Lakota and Cheyenne at the battle of Little Big Horn—with Indian tribes killing each other as well as killing American soldiers, and soldiers drinking heavily and sometimes betraying one another.

Toward the end of the book, Philbrick has the following to say:

“In the almost century since Little Big Horn, the Native population of the United States has been steadily increasing. The reservations continue to be plagued by a series of social issues. Unemployment, alcoholism, drug addiction, and a high suicide rate. There are positive signs: Traditional practices such as The Sundance are making a comeback. Some Tribes have begun buying back land the government took from them in the nineteenth century... the Lakota and the Cheyenne have endured.”



And thus, David and I have almost finished this book. And thus we spend our evenings. Actually, this is a wonderful, exciting, and true story of our land. And I recommended it for your reading...if that's how you like to spend your quiet time as we do. And this story is a true thriller. And so I share it with you for your consideration.

October 18 to October 24 is International Infection Prevention Week

I would like to take this opportunity to touch on community infection prevention. There have been several cases of foodborne illnesses in the news this summer, as well as the ever-expanding cases of measles. They include:

- E. coli linked to frozen blueberries
- Cyclospora linked to iceberg lettuce
- Salmonella linked to jalapeño peppers
- E. coli and Salmonella linked to Alfalfa sprouts
- Measles

How these infections are transmitted - to stop or decrease the rate of transmission, we must include the following:



- Do not eat recalled products. Throw them away or return them
- Wash any surfaces in contact with contaminated produce with hot, soapy water
- Hand washing and thorough washing of all fresh fruit and vegetables
- Personal protective equipment (masks, gloves)
- Proper disposal of infected material
- Be educated about working with people infected with diseases that are airborne, droplet (measles), or by contact

Symptoms of foodborne illness needing urgent call to your provider:

- Diarrhea for two days that is not improving
- Diarrhea with fever greater than 100 degrees F
- Bloody diarrhea
- Severe stomach cramps
- Vomiting, not able to keep fluids down
- Dehydration – dry mouth, decreased urine output, drop in blood pressure, or dizziness



Symptoms of measles usually present 7 to 14 days after exposure. They include:

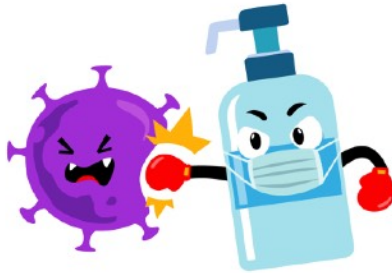
- Fever
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Red eyes
- Rash

Measles is highly contagious, and the virus can live up to two hours in the air after an infected person leaves the area. It is usually spread by coughing or sneezing. Anyone with measles can spread the virus to 90% of non-vaccinated people around them. It's important to take the following steps:

- Call your doctor immediately if you or your child has been exposed.
- Steps can be taken to manage your symptoms and guide your treatment.
- Stay at home until the fifth day after you develop a rash
- Stay away from people at home who aren't sick
- If you're heading to the ER, call ahead to notify them of possible measles infection

Cleaning and general hygiene

- Areas where care is provided must be cleansed regularly using disinfectants to prevent spread of disease.
- These areas include commonly shared areas such as bathrooms, equipment, and other surfaces.
- A specified bathroom for the infected person is ideal; however, this may not always be practical.
- Pay attention to faucet handles, light switches, and other areas the person may touch.
- If caregivers or visitors are allowed, it is important to inform them of any measures they



must take to avoid contracting the disease, i.e. hand washing, mask, gloves/gowns etc.

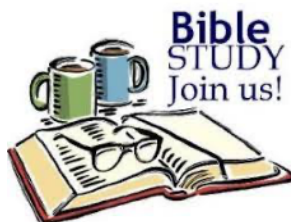
- It is important to educate them why these measures are necessary.
- If your loved one is in a care facility, the rules of that facility must be followed

Measles was said to have been eliminated in the year 2000. There were a total of 3873 cases reported between 2001 and 2019. 747 of those were from international visitors. Since then, cases have increasingly spread to many states and have exploded, especially in areas where measles vaccine rates are low. Childhood vaccines have contributed to the 2000 designation, but in recent years there has been so much debate about the vaccines. Some have decided not to take them. Then there are conflicting messages coming from our federal health departments that cause confusion. Vaccines have been safe for years. Please discuss with your pediatrician or trusted provider for guidance.

As of August 18, 2026, the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) has formally declared the outbreak in Buckingham and Cumberland counties ended. Let us strive to aim for the status we once enjoyed in 2000 and keep our communities safe and healthy.

The Christian Year

This essay is written by an unrepentant, unreformed, and unreconstructed Anglo-Catholic and arch-traditionalist. None of this is dogma, but it does have value in the life of the Church and her children.

Holy Mother Church has given us a framework for worship and our sacramental lives together. Most of us rather enjoy and are grateful for some structure to our lives. Let's look at the calendar months of July, August, and September and what the feasts celebrated in those months point us to and to Him.

In July, following on the great feast of the Apostles Peter and Paul on June 29, the church leads us to others who knew and worshipped the Risen Christ. On July 22, there is Saint Mary Magdalene – as a noted theologian always said, the “slightly hysterical Mary Magdalene”- traditionally, she is the woman taken in adultery and who is saved by Jesus, who asks the crowd to only cast the first stone if they are without sin. Mary is also believed to be the sister of the practical and dutiful Martha and of Lazarus. Jesus was their friend and often stayed with them in Bethany outside Jerusalem. He raises Lazarus from the dead in the major miracle that leads to his crucifixion. Mary – slightly hysterical- with her friends Mary Salome and Mary Cleopas goes to the tomb on Easter Day, but finding it open and no body within, she runs away from her friends to find the apostles. She does not see the angels as do Salome and Mary Cleopas, but she does later that day see the Risen Lord and again runs to tell the Apostles what she has seen.



Parenthetically, it should be noted that traditionally Mary Salome, wife of Zebedee and mother of James and John, is the sister of Mary Cleopas, wife of Alphaeus, mother of James (the less) and Jude Thaddeus, and they are both sisters to the Blessed Virgin Mary. When, after being called to the Tomb by Mary Magdalene, Peter and a leader go in before the boy John and find nothing, have no idea of what has happened, and stagger away. Only John- the Beloved Disciple picks up the grave clothes (The Shroud of Turin and the Cloth of Orvieto?) and knows in his heart that the Lord is Risen. His faith is so strong that he does not need to see Him to believe.

Following on the Feast of the Magdalene, the church observes St. James (the great), who is not only first cousin to Jesus but the first of the apostles to die a martyr. We should observe him at St. Martin's because he is the patron saint of the great church on Franklin Street that founded this parish. James is believed to have taken the Gospel to Spain, and after his death in Jerusalem, his body was taken by faithful followers and buried at Compostela in Spain, where a great Cathedral is built to enshrine his relics and is a major pilgrimage site today.

Then we have the Feasts of the Parents of the Virgin Mary - Saint Anne and Saint Joachim. The English have long called Holy Anne “God's Gran” – we have a church dedicated to her in Appomattox, VA and we honor these for their influence and guidance as grandparents to Jesus – we only have to think of all that our grandparents meant to us to appreciate these holy saints.

And towards the end of the month, there is a feast that celebrates Mary and Martha and Lazarus. Even before Dan Brown, their story after the Resurrection and Ascension is remarkable.

In August, among others, the Church celebrates The Transfiguration of Our Lord, where he reveals his divine glory to Peter, James and John. It is a major feast and is today observed more often on the last Sunday before Lent/ Ash Wednesday.

On August 15 the Church celebrates the life, death and Assumption to Heaven of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Again, what a wonderful woman she must be to have reared the Christ Child- stood at the foot of His Cross and mothered the new church until He takes her home.

The Apostle Bartholomew- patron of a neighboring church is celebrated on the 24th of August. Flayed alive for his Lord, you can see him pictured in Michelangelo's "Last Judgement" on the wall above the altar of the Sistine Chapel. His relics rest in Rome.

He is followed in the calendar by St. Monica and her son St. Augustine of Hippo.

September gives us another Feast of The Blessed Virgin- her Nativity and another reminder of our Lord's Incarnation. On the 14th we observe the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, commemorating the 'finding' of the actual cross of the crucifixion by the Empress St. Helena and her archaeological team. A relatively large piece is enshrined in St. Peter's in the Vatican, and another in the great church built over St. Helena's Palace and called The Holy Cross in Jerusalem – enshrined with it is a piece of the sign that Pilate had placed on the cross saying "The King of the Jews".....

St. Matthew the Apostle- tax collector, Evangelist and Martyr is observed on the 21st and we should remember our brothers and sisters who worship in a neighboring church dedicated to him. The Episcopal Cathedral in Dallas, TX is dedicated to him also.

And finally, on September 29 is the Feast of Saint Michael and All Angels- a great and mysterious feast. We should remember and give thanks for our own individual Guardian Angels and for the ministry of angels throughout the ages- I am sure you know many who are guided by the angels in teaching and healing and in watching over us.



The Church designates a number of days throughout the year as Holy Days of Obligation- days on which we make our communion as we promised at our Baptisms and Confirmations. They are not just Christmas and Easter. But seemingly to remind us of the centrality of the Dogmas of both the Incarnation and Redemption by His Cross and Passion and glorious Ascension, saints' days and other feasts are sprinkled throughout the year. They should be observed, if at all possible, at His altar. Like stained-glass, the saints are windows that show His Light and glory to us and lead us to Him.

Blessed be God in His angels and in His Saints.

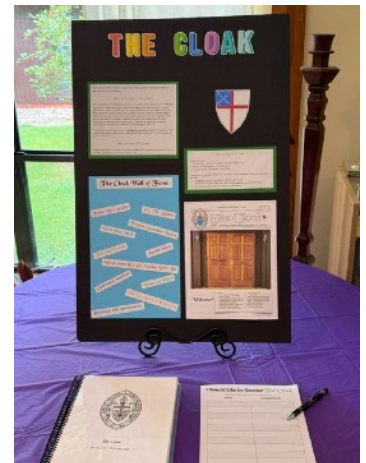

Help to keep it filled!



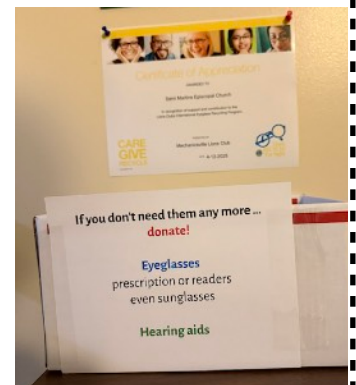
